I have been speaking to some of the residents of Week St Mary and did make my rather good, if I say so myself, suggestion that they float a balloon up to the height of the top of the blade so that people can get an idea if they will be visible from their home or not. Apparently this has been looked into and cannot be done because they would have to obtain permission from the Civil Aviation Society. Maybe that speaks for itself on the intrusiveness of these turbines. I would say though, study all the information and make an informed decision, please do not let apathy win on this one and then turn round once they are installed "Oh there! I didn't realise they were so high" TOO LATE!

The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 3rd Tuesday of every month (except,for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 in Winter months and 8 pm in the Summer. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

<u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council Meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the Minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall Notice Board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 18th February, 2014

- 1. Mr Norman Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with a full attendance of Councillors and three members of the public.
- 2. Roads Clerk to write to Oliver Jones regarding the state of the road from Eden Chapel to Ferrets Cross and from Jacobstow to Week St. Mary via Certificate Hill.
- 3. <u>Cornwall Council Mobile Library A 12 week public</u> <u>consultation is taking place on recommendations to replace the</u> <u>Council's existing mobile library and mobile one stop services</u> with a range of community based initiatives.
- 4. <u>Cornwall Council Home to School Transport</u> Clerk to write to Cornwall Council asking them to re consider charging 8-11 year old children to be transported to school. State that we feel this will have an impact on the environment in the village as people who cannot afford the transport, maybe they have two or three children at the school, will drive them to school.
- 5. <u>Donations</u> It was decided to give the annual donations to the following:- Jacobstow Church, Eden Graveyard Fund, Cornwall Air Ambulance, League of Friends of Stratton Hospital, Marie Curie, Bude Memory Café, CAB and Childrens Hospice SW.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 18th March, 2014

- 1. Mr Norman Osborne chaired the Annual Parish Meeting with a full attendance of Councillors, Speakers Mrs Jenny Owen, Jeremy Ward. Cllr. Nicky Chopak and twelve members of the public.
- 2. Mrs Jenny Owen talked on the Library which is now operating at the Old Wainhouse Inn. This is open from 10.0am until closing time of the pub. There is also a Computor there for anyone to use.

Cllr Nicky Chopak spoke on the year as a new Councillor. Mr Jeremy Ward spoke against the planning for the Big Field Wind Farm and Mrs Charmaine Smith read the yearly report from Jacobstow School.

This was followed by the monthly Parish Council meeting.

3. Planning Application – Good Energy Generation Ltd – Wind Farm development of up to 11 turbines (up to 125m to blade tip)on land adjoining Creddacott Farm, Week St. Mary. Councillors discussed this and it was decided to have an open Meeting for Parishioners on the 26th April, 2014 from 10.00am – 2.00pm.

BOB'S GARDENING SPOT

April is the ideal time to plant an evergreen hedge, but beware of the wind effect on plants. A strong wind can remove more water than a plant can take up from the soil so try to give the hedge a fighting chance by putting up a wind brake to shelter it from the worst of the winds.

Now is the time to tie in climbers, try to train the new growth horizontally so it flowers all along the stem and not only at the top. If you want to grow a fruit tree please buy a pot grown one, as the bare rooted trees will not like being moved once its in growth. Now is the time to sow all your salad crops, but only sow small amounts of lettuce, spring onions, radish etc. I only grow "Ferline" tomatoes because they are blight resistant.

Late April/early May is the time you should be planting your runner beans, french beans and sweet corn outside with a little cover of fleece for a short while Do not forget to sow your winter greens to get them ready to plant out at the right time.

You should be mowing your grass now, but start with the mower set high to just clip the top off and lower the blade later until you reach your summer cutting height. Protecting your pets with Vaccinations

Make sure you protect your pets and keep them safe by keeping up to date with their vaccinations.

If the number of pets protected by vaccines drops our animal companions could be at risk from an outbreak of infectious diseases, some of which can be transmitted to humans.



When to vaccinate

When puppies and kittens are born they are usually protected from infections by their mother's milk, providing she has been regularly vaccinated. However, this protection only lasts a few weeks so they need **regular vaccinations** from an early age.

Puppies are typically vaccinated at eight and 10 weeks, **kittens** at nine and 12 weeks, with an initial course of two injections. **Your young pet should then be given a booster 12 months after their first vaccination.**

Older pets need protecting too, as their immunity can decline. Speak to your vet as the regularity of your companions vaccinations can vary depending on the diseases prevalent in your area.

Vaccines against infectious diseases

Dogs should be routinely vaccinated against:

- Canine parvovirus and Parainfluenza Virus
- Canine distemper virus
- Leptospirosis
- Infectious canine hepatitis.

If your dog will be **spending some time in kennels** they may also be given a kennel cough vaccine. This vaccine is usually given intra-nasally (into a nostril) and protects against **bordetella bronchiseptica**.

Dogs travelling abroad may require a rabies vaccination.

- Feline herpes virus
- Feline calicivirus
- Feline leukaemia virus Current recommendations are for "at risk" pets only



- Myxomatosis
- Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease (RHD).



NICKY CHOPAK, Your Cornwall Councillor

Thank you for allowing me to give you a review of the past year through my eyes as a 'Newbie' Cornwall Councillor.

No –one warned me about the different types of situations I would become involved in – from blocked drains, pot-holes, overgrown hedges to poorly sited BT telephone poles to problems with council tax and housing benefit and major and some minor planning issues. I am a member of two committees, Finance and Resources and Health and Adult Care, both come with a 'health warning'! I have learnt very quickly, who are the best people to contact within Cornwall Council, and some of those I don't need to deal with!

Cornwall Council, since the inception of new administration, have come under huge budgetary pressures, which are currently leading to review of opening hours for libraries, one stop shops and mobile libraries and a major review of school transport services, which I have been working on to ensure it hopefully will not affect Jacobstow. These will be debated at full Council in the coming months. We already have had to make some difficult decisions regarding public toilets, some day care and elderly care homes, two of which were St Hilarys and the Foyer in Bude — both of whom looked after our most elderly & vulnerable residents. Along with cuts to public transport budgets, life in the rural communities has certainly become more challenging (as a politician might say!). The highways budget has been cut, so potholes will only be mended slowly!

Cornwall Council do not appear to be Truro centric, however the new Chief Executive Andrew Kerr is visiting Bude tomorrow, he is keen to encourage localism and get to grips with the challenges we face living in North Cornwall. So if you have any immediate concerns I am more than happy to raise them with him when I see him.

Will Easter Egg hunts become a family tradition in your family?

What you'll need:

Chocolate Easter eggs. Go for a variety - from small mini eggs to larger (more visible) foil wrapped eggs

WEATHERWISE by Monitor

January and February were so similar that for the purposes of this report I will for this time consider them together. Violent storms resulted from conditions which were unchanged to the close of last year, deep exceptional Atlantic storms produced heavy rain and high winds on the 3rd, 6th, 18th and very prolonged rain on the 18th. Thunder and



local thunder storms were frequent. The 6th January was the worst of these, producing lightening damage and power outages.

February was no better, storm conditions existed inland on the 1st, 4th, 5th, 8th, 9th, 12th, 14th and 15th, when it finally stopped, thank goodness! This period was indeed exceptional, producing extensive coastal damage and further power outages. Winds inland often exceeded 90 mph.

Rainfall collected at Canworthy Water was 9.9" for January and 8.28" in February, a total of 18.18" in two months, half a yard! Of note throughout this period were the actual depth of these polar storms, the one on 12th February was so deep at 939Mb that normal barometers would not go down that far - my "Shortland" model only reads down to 940Mb. Needless to say that such deep depressions produced tremendous high seas - the likes of this certainly havn't been seen in the south-west for many years

Recipe of the Month by Marion Reason

Muffins

Ingredients

5oz plain flour 1 egg

1/4 teaspoon salt 4 fl oz milk

2oz melted butter 1 ½ oz caster sugar

½ teaspoon vanilla extract ½ level tablespoon baking powder

Method

Preheat oven 200c 400f gas 6. Prepare tin either by well greasing or papers Sift together in a large bowl the flour, baking powder and salt. In another bowl beat the egg, add the milk, sugar, melted butter and vanilla extract. Mix well together then sift the dry ingredients again over the wet mixture. With a large metal spoon fold the dry ingredients into the wet, DON'T beat or stir and odd bits of dry mixture showing and a lumpy looking mixture is correct.

Now add your additions with just a couple of folds. Put straight into the cases and put them in the oven near the top for about 25 - 30 minutes. Put straight on the wire rack.


The less you mix the lighter the muffins

Additions:-

Blueberrys & Peacans. Chopped under ripe strawberries, Apricots, chopped apple, sultanas, seeds or nuts

If savoury leave out the vanilla and halve the sugar. Red onion - sauted first and cooled, Finely chopped bacon, cheese - grated or mozzerella - chopped herbs - finely chopped, chopped roasted veg, cold Parma ham, blue cheese crumbled. The list is endless!

Lodestone Edge Jacobstow

Dear Editor,

I was able to attend the Parish Council Annual meeting last night. There were three speakers and it was an interesting evening but the reason I am writing is because of the brief talk given by a representative from a Week St. Mary group who are very concerned about the application to build a Wind Farm adjacent to their village.

These windmills are going to be 120 feet taller than the present windmill at Otterham. When in position they will be 800ft, above sea level which means that they will be visible right across the area including from Jacobstow and Launceston! The wing span of the arms will be 80ft, and these have to be delivered intact on lorries there will be an immense building project to erect the windmills and the proposed traffic will come via Wainhouse corner. To facilitate the large vehicles the small bridge on the week St Mary Road will be destroyed and rebuilt.

Like all of this parish, we have also received Good Energy material through the door, however, in my view, this does not outline the down side of their business project. I have always thought that Windmill power has a part to play in our lives but I do believe that this undertaking is just too destructive and will have a very adverse effect on our local environment.

Last night the Parish Council agreed to run an open day so that they can find out how parishioners of Jacobstow feel about Good Energy's planning application. I hope lots of us will be able to find out more about the project. If we feel that it is not the best thing for this area we need to make this known by writing to Cornwall Council, or to the Clerk of our Parish Council whose address is available. We only have a short time to do this.

Week St Mary Windfarm

I have just woken up to reality! I've known for some time that a windfarm was proposed for the next Parish but hadn't realised until now that it is virtually on the boundary with Jacobstow and can be seen for miles around. Did you know this? The reasons against windfarms are well documented so I am not going to repeat them here, other than the fact that it does affect house prices – ask any Estate Agent! As you might know the Cornwall Council website allows individuals to make comments (either for or against) on Planning Applications and at present the comments in favour greatly outnumber those who are against the windfarm. Having had experience of similar proposals I found this very suspicious and investigated further as it is normally only a few in favour and the overwhelming majority against. With very few exceptions the people in favour are not from this area and it would appear that the developer, Good Energy. could well have written to each of their existing customers asking them to write in to Cornwall Council with letters of support. From previous occasions I recognize the names of other supporters as belonging to the Green Party or one of the Transition groups. I would emphasise that there is nothing illegal in this and everyone is entitled to an opinion. However, it does mean that a windfarm next to Jacobstow could be determined by people from Penzance, Hayle, Lostwithiel and numerous other places in Cornwall – or even elsewhere in the UK! To give you an idea of size, the Jacobstow Parish Church is 40m high, the windturbine at Otterham is 70m and Big Ben is 96m but the proposal for Week St Mary is for 11 turbines each having a height of 125m. As an individual you can do something about it. It was "people-power" that stopped the proposed windfarm at Davidstow, which shows that it can be done. If you don't want a windfarm on our doorstep then you need to contact Cornwall Council Planning Department and let them know. The Planning Application reference is PA14/02107 and you can either email them or write to them at County Hall, Truro. Obviously if you are in favour of the proposal then you can let them know that.

Let them know what you want. In this instance sitting back and doing nothing is not an option. Michael Quance, Lodestone Edge, Jacobstow.
