

# Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 18th May, 2010

**First Step Homes** - The monthly meeting started with a talk by Stefan Klimek from First Step Homes on affordable housing for the local community. They are proposing to build ten or more houses just outside the development boundary. These would be two and three bedroom houses which will only be sold to local people i.e. people born and educated in the parish or neighbouring parishes. Some would be on a shared ownership basis.

**AGM** - As this was the Annual General Meeting the election of Officers then took place.

Re-election of the Chairman, Mr. Norman Osborne, Re-election of the Vice-Chairman, Mrs. C. Smith. Re-election of the Clerk, Mrs. D. Turner who is also the Responsible Financial Officer.

<u>Crime Report</u> - The weekly Crime report was received from the Bude Police for Councillors to read.

*Insurance Premium* – It was agreed to pay the Insurance premium amounting to £309.61p.

<u>Speed Watch</u> – Mr Adey reported on Speedwatch saying that the occasional vehicle is still going through at 60mph and that several people had been sent letters from the Police regarding speeding.

<u>Neighbourhood Watch Inauguration</u> - The Neighbourhood Watch Scheme is going ahead. Parish Council agreed to pay for the signs, this amounts to £90.

## Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 15th June, 2010

*Mr* Norman Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with five Councillors and five members of the public attending. Apologies received from one Councillor who could not attend.

<u>Neighbourhood Watch Signs</u> - Mr Adey thanked the Council for their donation for the signs and said that they were being erected the next day. The Neighbourhood Watch officially starts then.

<u>Rural Post Offices & Shops</u> - The Chairman had attended a recent meeting and it was stated that there is no programme to close Post Offices at the moment. They advised to "Use it or lose it"

<u>Bude Network</u> – Mr Reason reported on the recent Network meeting. Affordable homes for local people will be discussed next month.

<u>*Crime Report*</u> – The weekly Crime report was received from the Police and read to Councillors.

<u>Speedwatch</u> – Mr Adey reported on Speedwatch stating that they had done two hours the day before and that it has now officially gone County wide. One in four Watches will now have a Policeman in attendance. Police will also be looking for people with no seat belts, using mobile phones etc.

# Interview of the Month with Doreen Turner

Doreen lives at Canworthy Water I met her there on the farm that is her home. We sat in her sunny garden, with an occasional visit from her grandson Alfie who was helping his Father with the cattle (Alfie is two in July).

#### *How long have you lived here Doreen?*

Well I was born in Warbstow then we moved to Canworthy Water and I went up to Warbstow school. So this has always been home. The railway was still here then, with a station at Tresmeer. 'smeer was its local name. The highlight of the summer holidays was going by train to Padstow for the day> When I married Mervyn, in 1965, I came to live here at the farm , so I didn't move far. This farm has been in the same family for at least four generations. My son runs the farm now. Mervyn died in November 2006.

#### That must have been hard for you?

It was, we'd been married for 43 years and I'd known him or six years before we married. The last few years have been difficult ones. But I am lucky to have two daughters and a son and four lovely grandchildren, with another one on the way.

#### Have you seen many changes over the years of farming ?

Well, there are things like size of the machinery, you used to see smaller tractors, no electronics in those days and you often had to use a starting handle to get them going. Nowadays we are used to larger machinery, inside as well as outside. Years ago my husband had a herd of fifteen dairy cows, and that was not unusual, we built the herd up to Ninety or more, but that is small compared with now. The herds tend to be much larger. We rear mainly sheep now, we have a flock of 400, and my son works part of the time as a life guard on the local beaches. So you could say we have diversified!

#### Did you work, apart from the Farm?

No, before I married I worked at an insurance office in Launceston, I used to ride my Lambretta scooter to work and I remember my hands got so cold by the time I got to the golf course I had to stop to thaw them out so I could change gear in the town! The roads were a lot quieter then. Now if you try to move animals there will be six or seven cars queuing, to get by. I didn't go out to work after I married. We didn't in those days.

#### When did you become Parish Clerk?

I was offered the job ten years ago after Molly Parsons retired. Do you know she'd been Parish Clerk for forty years, and had established some strict rules!! The job has changed with the increase in computers. There is a lot of e mail and the 'postage cost' is transferred to the receiving council. Just look at the cost of ink and paper! I think my time learning typing and shorthand at college years ago has been helpful for this job.

# County Council Report by Cllr Phil Tucker

There has been a recent trend, after finishing exams, for youngsters to go to Newquay. These young people come from all over the country to generally chill out after the weeks and months of revision and work. Generally the appearance of these students is upbeat and certainly these youngsters enjoy their first real freedom from parental control.


There are issues however, as we saw last year, where these people are using this freedom to indulge in drinking large quantities of alcohol. It should be made clear that special training at retail outlets along with spot checks of supermarkets and off licences and test purchasing means that very little is sold from local retail outlets. Predominantly adults are buying and supplying alcohol to minors. There are many instances where parents, when dropping off their child, have also dropped them off with crates of beer and bottles of vodka presumably assuming that we will look after them if they get into trouble. Most of the children arriving are 16 or 17 but some are as young as 15. The Police have already collected children this year, children unconscious from alcohol; the officers have called the parents to demand that this child is collected immediately and we have informed their local police of the situation so the message does "follow them home". So many children requires a huge response from Council services, for where there are children you may be assured there is also the less desirable elements of society; the petty thieves and worse. The risk of fire is also increased, the cocktail of inexperience; alcohol and crafty cigarettes, nightlights and Chinese lanterns.

The reason I have highlighted this is, while the services in Cornwall have been commended for their handling and response last year, the cost is being borne predominantly by the Council and therefore the Council Tax Payer. CCTV coverage alone has exceeded the budget by a significant amount, the Fire & Rescue Service have drafted staff from other stations, social services and child services have stationed staff, and the police have significantly increased their presence.

The emphasis this year quite rightly will be to make those responsible, for supplying age restricted products, pay for their actions. The government mantra is "every child matters", which is a demand correctly embraced by the council but this is at a significant cost to the tax payer because of the actions of a few, rather selfish, individuals. I write this long before the print date of the Journal so I don't know what events have unfolded from Newquay this year. I hope it has been a chilled well earned rest for students, keen to surf and enjoy the weather this year.

# Letterboxing on Dartmoor by Geraldine Smith

I always enjoyed walking but my children needed more to amuse them than just a walk. My Uncle, who was involved with Scouts, introduced me to Letterboxing which can be enjoyed by the whole family. Letterboxing is a combination of orienteering and treasure hunting where clues are used to locate boxes placed on the moor. Each box contains a rubber stamp and a visitor's book. Walks can be close to the road, or for the more experienced orienteer, further afield; there are also charity walks and walks with an accomplished letterboxer. Walks can also have a theme where the stamps feature a pattern such as Disney characters. To go letterboxing you require an inkpad, notebook or set of blank cards (this being best if children are involved as they like to stamp their own cards), an Ordinance Survey map, a compass, suitable clothing and plenty of food and drink for those hungry youngsters!

We would set off as a large family group and good natured discussion would follow between the adults as to which way to go and in deciphering the clues. Once a direction had been established off the children would go each hoping to be the one to discover the box, discrete help being given to the younger members or to those yet to find a box. On discovering a box great excitement would follow – you could compare it with England scoring a goal! Adults would produce the inkpad and everyone took turns to stamp their card and sign the visitor's book. My Uncle had his own stamp which he would use in the visitors book, but this had to be registered with the club.

While the children hunt for the boxes the adults can take some time to enjoy the surrounding moors and, if they are lucky, some of the wildlife. Once you have obtained a hundred stamps you can become a member of the 100 Club and receive a cloth badge and car-sticker. There is a letterbox meet in Princetown in October and March where you can purchase walks, maps and other goods and meet fellow letterboxers.

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# Speedwatch - a report by Dennis Adey

Two to three years ago, a police initiative set up by Gary Watts (now Sergeant) of Bude Police station, under P.A.C.T (Partnership and Communities Together) brought local parishes together, to ascertain their concerns within our local communities of crime/unsafe feelings. One of these concerns appeared to be speeding, ours particularly the speeding through Wainhouse Corner.

Some two years ago, a "speed watch" team of volunteers were schooled by the police to monitor the traffic on the A39 passing through Wainhouse Corner. This is done as regularly as possible, weather and volunteers permitting. Passing traffic speeds are monitored from both directions within the 40mph limit.

We only have a very small number of volunteers, three people need to work together at a time, in a cold and windy spot for a couple of hours, even in the wet!

However, the entire aim of speedwatch is to try and encourage motorists to be aware that they are passing through a 40mph limit, at a busy junction of both traffic and pedestrians. A re-education of road awareness!. Day time speeds have been recorded of up to 64mph ! Teams are running in several North Cornwall parishes and it is about to be put into operation throughout Cornwall.

We do need help doing this survey so please contact Dennis Adey at Springwood if you would like to assist.

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# Recipe of the Month by Marion Reason

This month - a Tomato Tart (with a difference!)

<u>Main Ingredients</u> Puff Pastry (ready-made or make your own) 1 red Onion 10-12 Cherry Tomatoes or 4-5 larger ones 1 tbsp Crème Fraiche 1 clove Garlic Salt

Dressing 2-3 Cornichons or tsp Capers 3 tsp White Wine Vinegar 3 tsp Olive Oil

Oven Setting: 200 deg.C, 400 deg.F, Gas Mark 6

Put a baking tray in the oven.

Thinly slice the onion and sweat in a little oil or butter until cooked, put in a dish and leave to cool. Roll out the pastry ¼ inch thick and cut out a 6-7 inch square. Put the pastry onto a piece of baking parchment and ½ inch from the edge cut a mark all the way around <u>but not all the way through</u>. It should now look like a "picture" in a "frame". Brush the "frame" with egg or milk and prick the "picture" all over with a fork. Mix together the onion and Crème Fraiche and add the garlic and salt. Pile the mix onto the "picture" but leave the "frame" clean. Halve (or slice) the tomatoes and put on top. Sprinkle with salt and place it (still on the parchment paper) onto the hot baking tray and bake in the top part of the oven for 20-25 mins.

To make the dressing chop the cornichons (or capers) and mix well with wine vinegar and olive oil.

Serve the tart hot or warm and put the dressing on when serving.

Four variations for this recipe.

- 1. Add 2oz Gruyere cheese to the onion/Crème Fraiche mixture.
- 2. 5 mins before the end of cooking sprinkle some Roquefort or blue cheese over the tart.
- 3. Sprinkle a small amount of curry powder over the tomatoes before cooking.
- 4. Instead of tomatoes use blanched asparagus with Gruyere cheese over just before the end. This is really lovely!!

# The Garden Spot by Bob Rudd

This time of the year, you should be thinking about your spring crops in the vegetable garden. A good crop filler is spring cabbage which can be cut for spring greens, a good cropping variety is "April". You should still be sowing lettuce, spring onions, radish, over winter onions and turnips.

This time of the year it is very important to keep gross feeder runner beans and climbing beans well fed and watered and keep picking your sweet peas, if you let them set seed you will not get any more flowers. This also encourages the bees to keep coming and pollinating your runner beans etc.

I have four apple trees in half barrels on the vegetable plot and these benefit from the bees coming to the runner beans and sweet peas.

In our vegetable garden we also have ten raised beds to overcome the very clay soil which is not very good for any root crops as the drainage is very poor, but clay soil is very fertile if you can break it down.

Now is the right time of the year to take cuttings of clematis, alpines, any half ripe shrubs such as geraniums and fuchsias and tender perennials. You should also be potting up prepared hyacinth and narcissus for Christmas flowering. Keep these in a dark, frost free shed or under a layer of peat or ashes outdoors until they start to grow. Also do not cut the grass too short if the weather is dry and hot. Happy gardening!
