Andrew O'Brien, Cornwall Council & Trand - Andrew O'Brien talked on Affordable Homes and said as a result of the recent forms sent to every household in the Parish there are 14 people who qualify for a home. Trand, the developers, are in contact with three Housing Associations. Trand are getting more drawings done and Pre Planning Application, we will hear more in July. It was with great sadness that Parishioners of Jacobstow and St Gennys heard of the death of Jim Cory who died on Monday 15th July at Derriford Hospital.

Jim was born at Trelay in 1934 and was educated at Jacobstow school before passing the 11+ exam and going on to Launceston College.

On leaving school Jim joined his father Ned farming Trelay. In 1959 he married Janet and had two daughters, Ann and Mary. He had a particular interest in Devon and Cornwall long wool sheep and still had a small flock at Wainhouse Corner.

In 1979 Jim and Janet moved to Beckavens which they farmed for twenty years before moving to Tregunna Close.

Jim devoted much of his spare time serving as a parish Councillor first at St Gennys and then Jacobstow being Chairman of both in turn. He was also Governor of Jacobstow School and Bude Haven. Jim also found time to be an active member of St Gennys Band for fifty years playing the cornet and sometimes bass. When marching in carnivals he banged the big drum!

He was a keen follower of rugby at Polson Bridge and spent many Saturdays supporting the home team.

Jim will be sorely missed by his many friends and neighbours and our sympathies are with Janet and daughters.

BOB'S GARDENING SPOT



August is the right month to sow spring cabbage plus main crop carrot, winter radish and turnips. You should be harvesting your runner beans, onions, shallots and garlic. The onions and garlic should be laid out in the sun to be totally dry to store for winter use. Tie in tomatoes, cucumber and peppers, also pinch out the side shoots between main leaves and stem on your tomato plants.

On the flower front you should be gathering sweet peas every day to keep the plants flowering later in the year. Your Dahlias will be flowering soon, so keep them well watered and fed. Now is the ideal time to take cuttings of your favourite plants to make sure you have them next year, some plants that lend themselves well to cuttings are Clematis, Geraniums, fuchsias and other tender perennials.

Plant evergreen shrubs before the soil cools down and it is also a good time to renew evergreen hedges. You should also be planting autumn flowering blubs and pot up narcissi for spring flowers. Pruning peaches and nectarines if its required can be done now. Strawberries which have fruited and are now looking scruffy can be cut down but try not to cut the main growing point. If your strawberries have been in the same bed for three years you should be moving them to a new bed. Any questions just drop me a line at the Journal, but for now, happy gardening

Theý were monsters, towering above us. High profile jackets and hard hats were provided. After a short talk we climbed the steps to the entrance and we were inside the "engine house" of the turbine. There was a hum of fans cooling the converters and a muffled thwack of the rotors going round. Amazing views towards the quarry.

There were 10 installed in 1991 these were upgraded in 2010 when 4 new ones were erected. Annual Output 10,000 MWhs to power 3000 homes now Annual Output is 25,800 Mwhs to power 7800 homes

One of the most interesting things, which had nothing to do with turbines, was a large John Deere Tractor cutting grass at over 30' at a time.

While we were there he finished 3 large fields. What a long way we've come from hand scythes and horses.



Wainhouse Corner – Proposed

Affordable Housing for Local People - Information provided by Trand 10 affordable homes, of a mix of sizes, all prioritised for local people, are being proposed for a site at Wainhouse Corner. The site is next to 'Wainways', on the road heading south-east towards Canworthy Water. Also

5 market homes, to help pay for the affordable housing. The proposed design looks to the local vernacular and utilises slate roof,

render, slate hanging and limited stone. The design will front the road with a 'courtyard' feel to the rear of the site to emphasise the rural nature. A minimum of 2 parking spaces per home will be provided. The homes will meet level 3 of the Code for Sustainable Homes.

The developer is Trand (UK) Ltd. A recognised social landlord, probably a housing association, will become the owner/landlord of the completed homes.

More details, including the proposed layout of the development, are available on Trand's website (<u>www.trandliving.co.uk</u>). There is also an opportunity to comment, or ask questions, via the website. Trand will report back to the Parish Council on comments received. All being well the planning application will be submitted during the coming autumn.





Chairman Norman Osborne


Norman has lived in the village for 25 years and been chairman of the Parish council for the last 10 years - he is a

WEATHERWISE by Monitor

May was more of a mix than usual this year. An often dull and overcast month, the early part having a few good days, the 6th got to 19°C and the 7th to 20°C. But the month was dominated by cold winds - only 10°C was reached on the 16th.



Heavy persistent rain was observed on

the 14th, giving a total of .78" for the day and the light winds generally turned quickly in the evening to gale force from the North-West in heavy rain showers. A total of 3.26" was collected at Canworthy Water for the month.

However, June was a lot better, Fairly warm on a number of days, and little of any significant rainfall to report locally, only the 15th producing wet and quite windy conditions. A total of 0.9" was collected here. Winds were frequently cool and drying.

Of the 2 months, very little thunderstorm activity was observed despite some developments over the channel, this seems to be the trend of recent years.

Far away in the tropical Atlantic, only tropical storm "Chantal" has to date produced any weather of significance.

Sea temperatures here are currently a couple of degrees below average, this being very noticeable with any winds on shore along our west-facing coasts so far this year.

Recipe of the Month by Marion Reason

Tomato and Mascapone Sauce

Ingredients

1 large onion - finely chopped 400g tin chopped tomatoes 1 tsp sugar 250 g mascapone cheese



2 cloves garlic - crushed
2 tblsp tomato puree
¹/₂ tsp salt
1 dessert spoon white wine vinegar

Method

Sweat the onion with a knob of butter until opaque, not browned. Add the garlic and sweat for a couple more minutes. Add the tomato puree and sweat for another couple of minutes while stirring. Add the tin of tomatoes, sugar, salt and white wine vinegar and bring to a gentle simmer for about 5 minutes. Add more vinegar, salt or sugar to taste. Stir in the mascapone and bring it back to heat.

Suggested recipes

Add pre-cooked veg, aubergine, carrots, leek, beans, broccoli, cauli, peas or any combination you fancy. Layer between pasta sheets, make a béchamel or cheese sauce for the top, cover with grated cheese and put into the oven on 180c for about 30 minutes.
 Just add to plain cooked pasta and top with parmesan for a guick



3. Leave out the mascapone and add the sauce to fish or chicken.

4. Add chilli sauce or flakes to either sauce to your taste and used with burgers, chops or steaks.

5. De-skin sausages and make into meat balls, add to the sauce and add to potatoes and veg.

The sauce with or without mascapone or chilli can be used for practically anything you feel like putting it with - very versatile!

Interview with Rachel Wren By Jeanne Gimblett

I had the pleasure of meeting and talking to Rachel this month, a perfect warm day to meet with her as she always looks so 'summer-bright'. Most readers will know Rachel and her family, her husband Jamie and their two children Kieran and Logan, but you may not know that she has designed the majority of the Jacobstow Journal covers for the last two years.

Rachel grew up in St Gennys and went to Jacobstow school and then Budehaven when, after sixth form, she obtained a place at UWIC (University of Wales Institute Cardiff) where she studied product design for her BA.

Much of the course entailed hand-drawn schemes and model making with an emphasis on ergonomics. She explained that this was the manner in which design fits with human needs and interaction. She told me about her final project at UWIC where she designed a remote control suitable for children. It had to be the right shape for smaller



hands, have inviting colour, appropriate size buttons and so on.

During her degree course Rachel learned to use computer software, such as Photoshop and AutoCad, to help her create displays and models for presentation.

Rachel explained how she had always loved making things

and at a very early age she would help her Dad, Gordon, when he was 'pottering' in the shed. She thinks that all the family are fairly creative as her brother is a builder and her sister, who studied graphic design, now works on layout for The Bude and Stratton Post

After UWIC Rachel continued to work at The Cabin until she got a job with Deesign Partnership (later became Muck Truck UK). Initially she was employed in reception but with all her skills it is not surprising that she redesigned the firm's website and did much of the advertising - at the same time as running the office!

Rachel and Jamie were married at St. Gennys Church and now live at the top of Edgar Road. She is still working hard, as a full time mother of two, but finds time to keep working on design projects.

This month's cover of bathers and sea was created by using the computer. Rachel told me how she had put it together- first she designed the background and then, with Photoshop tools, she created the coloured flags.

Finally she captured pictures from the web and used parts, little people and other objects to create the finished scene. She said that it was very similar to making a collage only it used computer technology. Rachel also designs business cards, wedding stationary and anything else you can think of. Her life is extremely busy but she loves walking and with two small boys, plus the family spaniels, she certainly gets plenty of exercise. She and Jamie also cycle with the children and enjoy the beach and park.

Rachel still has time for her newest interest which involves baking and icing special cakes. She has made Jamie an iced bodice-shaped cake , highly successful, and is planning to turn Ben 10's Omnitrix watch (for those of you without small boys Ben 10 is a cartoon hero whose watch transforms him into one of any number of aliens) into a birthday cake for Keiran's birthday. It seems that Rachel cannot stop creating and I am sure I am not the only one who looks forward to seeing each new design on the Journal's front cover.
