

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 4th October, 2016

- 1) Cllr. Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with four Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak and three members of the public attending.
- 2) Notice Board It was agreed that a polite note should be kept in the Notice Board saying that this is for Parish Functions and not for businesses to advertise.
- 3) Tesco Bags of Help This is a new grant programme funded through the money raised from the 5p bag charge in Tesco stores in England. Correspondence passed to the School, Football Club, Surf Club etc.
- 4) Grant Thornton An account was received from Grant Thornton for the Audit which had been completed amounting to £120.00. Proposed we pay Cllr.Chapman Seconded Cllr.Franklyn
- 5) Grant Letters Letters of thanks received from Organizations that a Grant was paid to.
- 6) BT Telephone Kiosk Clerk to write to BT asking if we can keep this Kiosk

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 1st November, 2016 1) Cllr.Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with a full attendance of Councillors, County Cllr.Nicky Chopak and two members of the Public.

2) <u>School Broadband</u> – The School Broadband speed was again discussed. The School pay the line rental to BT but they don't do the security the school need so the Broadband is not with BT. Clerk to write to MP Scott Mann asking again what can be done.

3) <u>Kernow Matters to You – Say No to Devonwall</u> – Correspondence e mailed to Councillors to read before the meeting. It was decided not to object as a Council but individuals can object if they so wish.

4) <u>**Parish Footpaths</u>** - Cllrs.Osborne & Chapman had met with Mrs Mary Carter regarding the proposed Kissing Gates to replace the stiles. The owners permission is required for this. Cornwall Council will pay for the equipment needed.</u>

5) <u>Bude Community Network Meeting</u> – Cllr. Osborne reported on the recent Network meeting he had attended. We need a representative to attend each meeting.

Feeling safe in your home? Bogus callers – sometimes called distraction burglars – usually prey on elderly or vulnerable households and the effect of their deception can be devastating. Some of the most common ruses used is for someone to turn up uninvited on your doorstep and claim to be from a utility company or someone who needs to check your property. Often you don't want to appear rude by asking them to leave but it is your home and you have every right to ask people to leave. The following advice applies: Not sure? Don't open the door! Ask them to leave and then call the police on 999. Before you answer the door go to the back door and make sure it's locked. Never leave someone inside your house while you go to check any claim they've made to you.




I was delighted to welcome the Prime Minister to Cornwall in October to discuss the county's future. Theresa May recognises the challenges facing Cornwall, such as transport links, education funding and economic development, and her visit was a great opportunity for elected representatives and the business community to constructively discuss how we can address these issues. Hot off the decision to choose Heathrow for airport expansion, Theresa May wanted to highlight how such a big project would benefit Cornwall. It would serve more destinations, and Newquay Airport is on that list. Shortly afterwards I wrote to both the Chancellor and the Transport Secretary urging them to address transport funding in the South West. The region currently receives the second lowest in the country, and I highlighted the need for a second railway line in Devon. Although it's vital that we make Dawlish more resilient, we also need a more resilient rail network, and having only one main route feeding Cornwall isn't good enough. By creating a through line between Exeter and Plymouth via Okehampton, this would open up more rural communities in Devon and North Cornwall and would also serve as an additional line should the mainline at Dawlish ever be closed because of storms or maintenance. During the autumn I sat on the Public Bill Committee for the Digital Economy Bill which will introduce a Universal Service Obligation of at least 10Mbps for broadband and a reformed Electronic Communications Code which will make it easier for phone operators to increase and enhance their mobile coverage across rural areas. In November I had a meeting with former Fisheries Minister and representatives of the Coastal Producer Organisation to discuss the future of our fishing industry post-Brexit. Small-scale fisherman have been hardest hit by the EU's quota system. They represent 77% of Britain's fishing fleet, yet they have access to just 4% of the quota. The CPO has been set up as a result to give small-scale fisherman with boats under 10 metres a louder voice in Europe.

Bird Watching at "Springwood"



We have had an ever increasing number of birds visiting our feeders over the past 15 years of living here at Jacobstow. The largest increase in visitors being Goldfinches-28 at any one time!! (During last midwinter 21 were still feeding daily). Siskins are the next group we have seen increase dramatically. Bullfinches visited us in

July and families of Woodpeckers, Nuthatches, Coal tits, Marsh Tits, Robins and of course the usual Blue Tits, Great Tits, Sparrows, Blackbirds, Jackdaws, Crows and Rooks were raised. We also had regular visits from Buzzards hunting and soaring over the Paddock.

But, our 'Piece de Resistance' having for the past 15 years enjoyed the arrival and breeding of swallows in our next door neighbours' barns (they breed horses, so have a perfect situation for nesting - some 4-6 pairs.) After all of our efforts, joy of joy, this July a pair inspected our covered sideway, picking the best spot to nest and rear 4 chicks.



On the 26th July they fledged, but were still roosting overnight. At present our pair are on their second brood, busy feeding 4 hungry mouths. We have a close up view of their progress



from one of our kitchen windows. We hope that after their 6,000 plus miles, they will fly this October to their wintering grounds and will return to us next year; we have a place for them! We accept that with all this good there must be bad - regular visits from Mr and Mrs Sparrow Hawk with funny antics when a strike proves unsuccessful. In July this year, a local Heron stopped by on its morning trip to its feeding lake

and returning in the evening to its nighttime lake butour fish managed to survive (as our pond is netted to safe guard the fish after two visits from otters we had some 10 years ago).

We are only 'armchair' watchers, but being involved with bird counts for British Trust Ornithology is interesting.

(*See Kids' Page) This simple act of giving has been both thought provoking and rewarding. I began by giving lovely cuddly toys but then I started to worry about all the teenagers who also needed love and attention and I tried to get things that they would like.

The Refuge is a charity and was founded in 1979 by women from local churches who sought to provide a temporary place of safety for women and children who were experiencing domestic violence. It has a 24 hour helpline open all year and answers over 1000 calls a year. It provides emotional support, practical advice on housing and benefits and can signpost legal representation. The trust needs reliable, friendly and enthusiastic people who can help with befriending, helpline, cleaning, refuge or fundraising.


CANWORTHY BOOK CLUB COMING HOME by Sue Gee

Overdoing Christmas Fayre? Try a nice sharp lemon posset

LEMON POSSET not freezable

600ml double cream Zest 3 lemons plus 75ml juice

Shortbread

140g cold butter diced140g plain flour85g caster sugar plus some for dusting50g ground rice flour or use extra flour85g flaked almonds



 Make posset first. Put cream in a big saucepan, heat, stirring, until sugar has melted. Turn off heat and stir in the lemon zest and juice. Divide between pots/bowls, cool and chill for at least 3 hrs or up to 24 hrs.
To make shortbread, heat oven to 160C140C fan/gas 3. Whizz the butter and flour together in a food processor until no lumps of butter remain (or rub together with your finger tips). Tip into a bowl and stir in the sugar, ground rice and almonds. Line the base of a roughly 22cm square tin with parchment. Tip the mixture in and press down firmly, making it as flat as you can. Dredge with more sugar and bake for 25-30 mins until pale

golden. Cool in tin.

3. Cut shortbread into shards and serve with the possets and little spoons.

LITTLE ICED LEMON MOUSSES - freezable

300g or 312g jar of lemon curdZest 1 lemon300 ml double or whipping cream25g lemon shortbread or crunchy lemon flavouredbiscuits

1. Put 2/3rds of the lemon curd into a large bowl with the zest and cream, then beat with electric whisk until it just holds its shape. Dribble over the rest of the lemon curd and divide between 6 small glass pots or glasses, marbling the curd through as you go. Sit the pots on a small tray, cover the whole lot with cling film and freeze for 30-40 mins.

2. Put biscuits in a strong plastic bag and bash with the end of a rolling pin to crumbs. When you are ready for pudding, remove the pots from the freezer (they should be ice cold but still soft and creamy), and top with crumbs and serve

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

BOB'S GARDENING SPOT

December is the best month to get your garden ready for next year. Dig any bare ground to leave a heavy top so the frost breaks it down to a fine tilth. Prune any fruit trees so they are open to let the air around and cut any crossing branches that spoil the shape. Cover any tender plants with a heap of compost to protect



them from the worst of the cold. You should be thinking about your supplies for next year as well as potatoes and vegetables you



might want to grow. Gather all leaves up and build a leaf bin by fixing four posts in the ground to form a square and fix chicken wire around them to keep the leaves from blowing away. You should get some good leaf mould later next year.

September and October continued to be generally quite settled months, a trend observed over the past year. Rainfall amounts were, as with 2015, moderate. At Canworthy Water 3.35" were collected for September, and only 2.05" for October. Compare the latter with 2013, when it was quite a wet month, 8.3" being recorded here, and frequently stormy.

October also continued the trend with being warm, 18°C was noted on several days, only a touch of ground frost and no gales. High pressure dominated the weather with easterly winds persisting for days on end.

In Tropical Atlantic, "Matthew" was a powerful hurricane and the most significant for a decade in the region, but most of the storms kept well away from land.

I see there is the usual attempt for "experts" to forecast the coming winter weather weeks, and sometimes months in advance. A contemporary model for this is the "North Atlantic Oscillation" which looks at the balance of high and low pressure to the north and south of the region. It tends to get quite a lot of publicity, which, of course, attracts funding and that's all, in my opinion it does. The NAO is simply an observation and has no effect on long term forecasting to any significant degree at all.

The ancient Babylonians are said to have been the first people to make New Year's resolutions, some 4,000 years ago. They were also the first to hold recorded celebrations in honour of the new year-though for them the year began not in January but in mid-March, when the crops were planted. During a massive 12 day




religious festival known as Akitu, the Babylonians crowned a new king or reaffirmed their loyalty to the reigning king. They also made promises to the gods to pay their debts and return any objects they had borrowed. These promises could be considered the forerunners of our New Year's resolutions.




A similar practice occurred in ancient Rome, after the reform-minded emperor Julius Caesar tinkered with the calendar and established January 1st as the beginning of the new year circa 46 B.C. Named for Janus, the two-faced god whose spirit inhabited doorways and arches, January had special significance for the Romans. Believing that Janus symbolically looked backwards into the previous year and ahead into the future, the Romans offered sacrifices to the deity and made promises of good conduct for the coming year.

For early Christians, the first day of the new year became the traditional occasion for thinking about one's past mistakes and resolving to do and be better in the future. In 1740, the English clergyman John Wesley, founder of Methodism, created the Covenant Renewal Service, most commonly held on New Year's Eve or New Year's Day. Also known as known as watch night services, they included readings from Scriptures and hymn singing, and served as a spiritual alternative to the raucous celebrations normally held to celebrate the coming of the new year.



To bring the history of New Year Resolutions up to date, in 2007 in a study of 3,000 people, 88% of them failed to keep their resolutions, so don't be too hard on yourself, after all we've been trying for over 4,000 years!.
