Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 4th October 2018

Cllr Osborne chaired the monthly meeting with a full attendance of Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak and two members of the Public.

<u>**Privacy Policy**</u> – A Privacy Policy for the Website was discussed and agreed that the Clerk should draft one and confirm it is OK with Councillors via Email.

Devon & Cornwall Police Merger with Dorset Police -

Councillors did not wish to make any comment on this.

<u>**Post Box**</u> – The Clerk reported that after correspondence with Royal Mail they have said that the post box will be replaced.

Cllr. Pallett reported that the Stile had been repaired as necessary. Cllr. Pallett also reported that Cornwall Council have agreed to do the suggested Road Markings at Eden Chapel.

It was reported that the hedge at Little Beckaveans needs cutting back. Cllr Chopak will get in touch with Cornwall Council. Hedges are the responsibility of the land owner. Maybe this could be put in the Journal.

It was suggested we put the Website details on the bottom of the Notice Board. Cllr.Smith to ask Mr Dereck Smith if this could be done.

Soldiers, sailors and airmen from Cornwall fought and died on many fronts. The Duke of Cornwall's Light Infantry, which lost over 4,500 men, participated in some of the most famous battles on the Western Front including Mons, Ypres and during the final '100 days offensive'.

The centenary of the armistice finds us united in respect and remembrance for all of the casualties of the Great War, but we also remember the sacrifice of British and Commonwealth troops who have made the ultimate sacrifice on battlefields since. We do not forget that servicemen from Cornwall have fallen in Afghanistan and Iraq, giving their lives to protect this country and our way of life. We shall remember them.

Bob's Gardening Patch

In December you should be planting next year's vegetables you may want to grow. Order your potatoes early to get the variety you want to grow and choose other vegetables you want for the coming year. If you are growing onions from seed, sow then over Christmas under cover and don't let the frost get to them.

Dig over any ground ready for the frost to break it up when it arrives. Any tender plants should be taken indoors or covered with fleece. I always's stuff straw into the top of my tree fern and wrap it in fleece, giving it plenty of protection. Do not wrap anything in polythene or it will rot if the weather turns warm and the plant sweats.

to the next one. Happy Christmas Bob



1914 Christmas in the Trenches.

Those who lived through the First World War experienced Christmas in a variety of ways. One of the most famous Christmas time events was the

truce that took place along some parts of the line on the Western Front in 1914. British officer John Wedderburn-Maxwell took part in the truce. He described what he did after it was stopped. "After the war had recommenced, I went up to see the Lincoln colonel. And there I found the second in command and the adjutant sitting down to a jolly good Christmas, which they'd sent across and told me to come and



join. And we had roast pheasant – it was wonderful the way they could cook in those trenches on charcoal fires – roast pheasant and plum pudding and plenty of rum. Of course, the colonel could always get rather more than the ration! No, we had a real slap-up meal".

WEATHERWISE by Monitor

The late summer and early autumn months of September and October were fairly similar this year, as both saw quite dramatic changes due to tropical storm remnants.

First though, the rainfall figures. September gave a total of 3.06" collected, whilst October



gave 3.1." The latter is quite a low figure for this month, and continues a trend observed since 2015. That said, the rainfall over the Cornwall area has been noted as varying considerably with far heavier falls on the windward side of Bodmin Moor - a function of southerly winds being more dominant than the usual south westerly/ north westerly transition of weather systems we expect in this part of the UK.

The trend towards a more SE wind direction (following on from the summer) certainly reflected in the temperatures, many days in September reached the 20's with high humidity making it feel somewhat warmer than the thermometer indicated.

The 20th to the 23rd gave a wet period, with 2.2" collected in the three days as an extra tropical storm passed through the area, with near-storm conditions at times during the night on the 20th.

October also saw a very warm day on the 10th, with a number up to this day in the 20's. The 12th to the 14th saw further storm conditions with the wind gusting to 34mph here at the station, and 60mph observed widely on high ground locally. Conditions were frequently very muggy with hill fog to the surface at times, very typical of extra tropical weather systems.

A sharp frost was recorded at -5°c on the morning of the 30th, with two thunderstorms observed on the 31st, as warm and humid air from the south gave a 13°c rise in less than an hour. The morning from -2°c, quickly becoming unstable as it met colder upper air on its passage. This gave the curious situation where the day maximum temperature had been reached by 1030 in the morning.

Can I pay in cash and cheques at the Post Office®?

You can pay cash in at any branch of the Post Office® including Wainhouse Corner. You'll just need to take your bank card and (for some banks) a paying in slip with you and the cash will be paid in instantly.



How much can I pay in?

At a main Post Office up to £20,000. However at Sub-Post Offices there is a limit. So check before hand.

What about cheques?

To pay in cheques, you can also just pop into Wainhouse Corner P.O.

First check with your bank that they have an agreement with the Post Office and ask for some special paying in envelopes. Most high street banks are in the scheme.

Make out a paying-in slip as normal and put it and the cheque(s) with your bank account number written on the back, into the bank's envelope.

On the outside of the envelope you'll need to fill in a couple of details, (account number and sort code) which vary slightly from bank to bank.

Give your completed envelope to the cashier at the Post Office.

You'll get a receipt for the envelope. The money can take up to 7 working days to clear, starting from the working day after you deposit the cheque. However, in most cases it'll clear in 5 working days.

What about taking out cash?

Cash with your bank card is available any time the shop is open - Monday to Saturday 7am-7pm and 7am-6pm Sunday - Isn't that a good deal?






E-Bikers of the World Unite! (You have nothing to lose but your blubber.) By Caroline V Pallett

"You don't have to turn up for work looking like a scarecrow, you know,"said a customer at the pub I worked at. He had had to give up his car and now had to travel by bicycle. His bicycle was powered partly by a lithium ion battery and partly by himself. He told me he had lost more than a stone and a half over only a few months. I had considered purchasing an e-bike for some time, and about seven years ago, I overcame my initial reservations and purchased a bottom-ofthe-range power cycle for £599 which came with free reflectors and a bell. It turned out to be an excellent investment for a number of reasons. Firstly, because of the power-assist function, hills were no longer a necessary evil. The bicycle in Holland has priority over all other forms of transport and every Dutch person I have ever seen is fabulously slim. However, Holland is pancake flat and does not have Millook or the hill through Warbstow that goes to Hallworthy, or the one at Crackington. E-bikes level the playing field. Secondly, e-bikes require no tax, insurance or MOT. The distance they can cover varies. My trustee old e-bike does about 26-30 miles, depending in the terrain (or 15 miles if you go up Millook on it). You can now buy bikes that can cover 60 miles or more if carefully ridden. Thirdly, e-bikes are incredibly environmentally friendly. The batteries require little electricity to charge them and I can charge mine off my little solar panel array at home, meaning that my bike is powered by myself and the sun. I reckon I have covered at least 15,000 miles on my e-bike since its purchase, with no deterioration whatsoever in its performance. That's a lot of planet that has been saved, because I usually make all short journeys on my bike. Apparently the vast majority of car journeys are less than 5 miles in length. If we all used e-bikes we could make a big dent in our collective carbon footprint. Most e-bikes have at least two power settings, so you can adjust the amount of 'assist' according to conditions or fitness level. You can switch off the battery and just use them as a normal bike, though they are a little heavier than standard bikes. For those a little intimidated by the hills around here, they are ideal, enabling you to still get about and enjoy the scenery. Initially potential manufacturers quite erroneously thought everyone who rode a bike was a would-be Bradley Wiggins, and therefore not want an e bike. Now around 50,000 are purchased each year in the UK! E bikes are fun; I have been exploring old railway routes that are now cycle ways, and the bonus is you can reach your destination with barely a hair out of place!





Celebrating 80 years of the Jacobstow WI

The Jacobstow WI was formed on 25th October 1938 with Mrs Ellen Browne elected as President. Tea hostesses were appointed for each month and were required to light the fire and lamps in the village hall before the meetings! A monthly competition was held and talks and demonstrations were given, often by members on subjects ranging from dressmaking to milk cookery. Games evenings were sometimes held with other WIs. A year later in 1939 all the programmed speakers withdrew owing to the War and it was unanimously agreed that the WI would carry on with a revised programme, chiefly working for comforts for the troops. Money was raised for this cause with whist drives, concerts and stalls. The members were also involved in making blackout curtains alongside the ARP and parcels were sent to men from the Parish serving in HM Forces containing a pair of socks, a knitted scarf and a 3 shilling postal order.

Members will recognise much from those first meetings and our membership numbers are also similar. That the WI traditions and friendship continue in Jacobstow after 80 years is truly inspiring. The Cornwall Federation celebrates it's Centenary in 2019 with many special events to enjoy throughout the year.

The club has flourished and now has 4 gig boats: Torrent, Rival, Porthcracken and Jan Rogers. There are both men's and ladies teams A, B, C (ladies), Vets (aged 40-50) and Supervets (aged 50+) as well as social rowers. Members of all ages and abilities take part in weekly on-the-water training, at Tamar Lakes and from Boscastle Harbour.





Once beyond the relative safety of the harbour walls, the row out is exhilarating and at times challenging, but rowers have a privileged view of the dramatic Boscastle and North Cornwall coastline. During both training

and social rows, wildlife is often seen, and this summer the conditions resulted in more sea rowing, and fantastic sightings of puffins, seals, blooms of jellyfish, and an array of fish and dolphins. Training at sea and at the lakes provides excellent preparation for regattas and competitions along the length of Cornwall and North Devon in stunning locations. This summer crews headed to the Scilly Isles for the World Championships, a unique experience with 150 boats and crews from as far afield as Holland and the USA, racing off a start line that was approximately 1 mile long. The Boscastle and Crackington Gig Club also host their own annual regatta in Boscastle, which in 2018 was a great



success, with a raffle, competitions, BBQ and a live Band. In September at the Ladies County Championships at Newquay, both A and B teams faced stiff competition but succeeded in

getting through to the second heat. Over the winter months the club will compete in the North Coast Winter League, and training continues in the build up for next year's 30th World Championships in the Scilly Isles.
