The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 1st Tuesday of every month (except for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 pm. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

<u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council Meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the Minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall Notice Board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting also the Agenda and Minutes of previous meetings are on the village website **www.jacobstowvillage.co.uk** 

#### Summary of Minutes held on 6th October, 2020

Cllr Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council which was held online via Zoom with four Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak and one member of the public attending.

**Planning Application PA20/07948** Outline Application for one dwelling, with all matters reserved except for access. – Land on West Side of 1 Barn Close, Wainhouse Corner, Bude. Clerk to reply saying Councillors wish to make no comment. **Planning Application PA20/03729** – Construction of 13 affordable dwellings to rent to include formation of new vehicular/pedestrian access and infrastructure – Land East of Oakdeane, Wainhouse Corner. Councillors unanimously agreed to support this.

**Planning Application PA20/05631-** Siting of fifteen bell tents with decking, fire pit and composting toilet. Provision of communal cooking and washing area. Provision of open-air freshwater swimming pool, formation of new vehicular/pedestrian access along with parking area and other associated needs Barton House, Canworthy Water, Launceston. Reply saying Councillors support the idea in principle but have major concerns.

Firstly this site is on a known flood plain also it has very poor road access. The car park is not big enough and is in the worst place for flood. The toilets and shower block can't soak away because of the ground conditions in that field. The soil is non permeable.

We would like the Planning Officer to visit and walk the proposed site. Four Councillors objected to this proposal and one is in support.

#### Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 3rd November, 2020

Cllr Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council which was held online using Zoom with six Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak and one member of the Public. Councillors unanimously agreed to co-opt Mrs Sarah Smith on to the Council to fill the vacancy.

It was noted that the pot holes that were reported the previous month had been dealt with. The question of a bus shelter was again discussed and it was agreed to find out the cost of one erected at Poundstock. St. Gennys had agreed to share the cost and there may be a second hand one available. The Cormac bus shelter was really expensive.

The Website was again discussed. Clerk to find out the full cost after the first year to make the Website fully accessible.

It was noted that Planning Applications for Barton House, Canworthy Water and Barn 2 Cottage Farm, Jacobstow had both been withdrawn.

Planning Application PA20/08441 – Change of use of a site in agricultural farmyard to a flexible use within class B8 – the parking of 4 vehicles – Treventon, Jacobstow. Councillors support this application.

Cornwall is recognised as having the lowest productivity rate in the UK. The rural productivity gap is in no way the fault of hard-working people in all our community, but the result of a combination of geographical and historical factors. I am committed to addressing that long-standing injustice. Civil servants are bound to a funding formula for infrastructure projects that means



they must seek best value for money. That has led to money being funnelled into already affluent areas. On education, for far too long, young people in North Cornwall have accessed higher education outside the county. Once they have qualified, the majority never return home. I am pleased the Government are offering more vocationbased skills learning and degree-level apprenticeships. I hope we can do more to improve the life chances of young people in and around the country. In North Cornwall, our offer for young people has drastically improved. Callywith College in Bodmin was recently rated outstanding in six areas by Ofsted. I look forward to working with the college and expanding its future offer. Moving on to health outcomes, the physical distance that some people must drive to visit GPs and cottage and general hospitals often means that more people live with conditions and must undergo lengthy surgery for treatment. They often rely on family members for that travel. That obviously has negative impacts on workplace productivity, but also on quality of life. The pandemic has proved that digital appointments with GPs can work, and some consulting can work. Further digitalisation of the NHS could mean rural and coastal communities accessing some of the best medical expertise in the country over Zoom or Skype without the need to travel vast distances.

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#### Jacobstow Art and Craft.

We have managed to have three meetings this Autumn before the new shut down. We met in the Parish Hall with plenty of room as there were never more than five of us and the Parish Hall has been well prepared for group use.

We decided to try our hands at making festive lanterns using balloons as a base and following this we started to learn how to make Macrame baskets. No more on that as we were only beginning to 'get the hang of it' before we had to cancel our November



sessions.

So here with some pictures is the description of how we made the lanterns:- After blowing up the balloons we covered then in vaseline to prevent the base material sticking to the balloon. We built the base

shapes from Plaster of Paris bandage -strips or Papier-Mache (see pictures 1) For the Papier - Mache we use strips of plain or coloured tissue paper and wallpaper glue to build a strong layer outer shell. When the basic covering was firm we burst the balloons we had used as



a base and began the more interesting work decoration - pics 3 & 4. Finished pieces can be lit from inside. We used battery T lights, or decorated with a string of battery lights fixed to the outside. There are many ways to show off your lantern: They can be added to a vase, hung on a wire thread if holes are pierced in the sides or fixed to a small jam jar lid at the base.



If you are thinking of trying to make one of these there is plenty of help on line. Just put Balloon Lantern DIY into your search engine. We hope to be back in January; just watch this space.


next year we will be back to normal, but for now have a lovely Christmas and New Year; stay safe.

#### Bob's Gardening spot

In December you should be looking at any vulnerable plants to protect them from frost. If they are in pots you could put them in a sheltered spot or a greenhouse. If they are in the ground maybe wrap them in fleece. Bush roses should be cut back by half to protect them from wind rock. Trees or shrubs should have any damaged or diseased parts removed. Earth up any spring cabbage you have to stop them from going over.Get your order in for next year's potatoes.

If the weather turns cold I put bubble wrap up inside my greenhouse on the North facing view to keep tender plants safe. Dig over any empty areas and leave the soil in clumps to let the frost break it down. It's been a funny year, but I like to think that escaping to the garden has really helped to make it that little bit easier. Take care, have a great Christmas and let's look forward to a better year!

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

#### David's Random Rambling's

Probably like many of you, I have to confess that I've been in a bit of a bard mood recently. This was made worse when I got word that senior management at the long-established department store in Belle Vue were considering changing the name of the establishment, fearing that it had become rather dated and failed to convey the image of a modern, vibrant retail business. Image consultants were therefore commissioned and focus groups convened to agonise over the issue and to decide upon a suitable title. Many meetings were held and debate was vigorous and sometimes heated until, eventually, somebody pointed out that, "Wroes by any other name.....". And, on the other side of that road, the camping and outdoor activity store will shortly be holding a massive seasonal sale. Now is the winter of their discount tent. Finally, my wife and I are trying to decide how best to replace an old ornamental jug of ours that was recently broken. Toby or not toby, that is the question. Must be off now - once more onto the beach, dear friends, once more!



September continues to be more summer than autumn of late, with little notable weather. Quite extensive hill fog was observed early in the month, there was a thunderstorm offshore on the 15th. Pressure remained fairly high for most of the month, with low '20's on many days which peaked at 22.7°C here at Canworthy water on the 17th. So apart from the reduced visibility,quite a pleasant month.

Matters changed bang on the Autumn Equinox. Pressure started to fall overnight on the 22nd with drizzle by late evening, overnight rain into the afternoon and heavy rain showers during the day on the 23rd. A thunderstorm was observed offshore late afternoon but remained clear of any land although heavy showers persisted. The following day saw near storm conditions gusting 30 knots here on northerly winds with hail and local thunder early evening. Changeable by the end of the month, quite warm again by the 28th with wet conditions to the last day. A total of 2.17" of rain was collected most of which was in the last week.

October started very badly. Tropical storm remnants affected the area on a number of days, and by the 4th 1.44" of rain had been collected, and this set a trend which saw no real improvement throughout the month generally. Only two days in any 24 hour period were completely dry, gales continued and thundery showers were observed into the last week which if nothing else did give a reasonably warm day on the 30th at 17.5°C. A total of 7.95" was collected for the month. This was on par with 8.41" for last year, and 8.3" for 2013.

Rainfall amounts in this part of Cornwall can vary considerably. I've had a couple of reports of a lot more than the amount collected here in the valley with some observers declaring this October being the wettest ever recorded, in particular around the moors locally. There is a distinct trend to this being a bi-decade event, with the period around 1990 and 2000 showing similar conditions.

#### OH WHAT FUN IT IS TO RIDE ON A ONE HORSE OPEN SLEIGH!

The sledge: 7000-4000 BC. From the beginning of human history people have dragged any load too heavy to be carried. But large objects are often of awkward shape and texture, liable to snag on any roughness in the ground. The natural solution is to move



them on a platform with smooth runners - a sledge. Sleds wer used as the normal form of winter transport near Stockholm c.1800. The people of Ancient Egypt are thought to have used sledges extensively in the construction of their public works, in particular for the transportation of heavy obelisks over sand. The same word shares common ancestry with both sleigh and sledge. The word sleigh, on the other hand, is an anglicized form of the modern Dutch word slee and was introduced to the English language by Dutch immigrants to North America.



The history of the world renowned Davos sledge started in the 19th century. Carpenters from Davos worked on further developing the Norwegian sledge. The sledge was given its name at the first, historic toboggan race in 1883 in Davos. The Davos sledge is traditionally fashioned from ash wood and is 80 to 130 cm long. The position adopted on a Davos sledge is more upright than on a toboggan. In contrast to a toboggan, the Davos sledge is controlled with the feet - by positioning the foot adjacent to the inside edge in the snow. The sledge is also braked using the feet. 
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#### Jacobstow Book Club

Once the 'Rule of Six' had been introduced, we could not meet at our usual venue but The Old Wainhouse Inn was able to accommodate us on a table for six and made us feel welcome and safe. Those of us who met had all enjoyed the two books we had read:

The Inheritance of Solomon Farthing' by Mary Paulson-Ellis; An old soldier dies in a nursing home and £50,000 is found sewn into the lining of his burial suit. Solomon, an old fashioned heir hunter, is given four days to find any of his relatives to inherit the money. During his search he discovers links to his own family history and the story begins to move backwards and forwards between the last days of WW1, to a troupe of soldiers billeted in an abandoned French farmhouse, led by Captain



Godfrey Farthing, Solomon's grandfather, and the race in Edinburgh in 2016 to find relatives, before a competing heir hunting firm beats him to it.



'Lockdown' by Peter May;

A bit too close to reality we thought but the lockdown in the novel is restricted to London and the story is a murder mystery, written 15 years ago. This is another of May's page-turning, fast moving thrillers. 

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#### **ANNE BATCHELOR**



#### 1867-1963

Rev Frederick Thomas Batchelor was Vicar of Calstock, married in Calstock Church to Charlotte Salisbury Trelawney (a descendant of Bishop Trelawney) whose family lived in Calstock. They lived there until moving to Jacobstow in 1865. They had 15 children in 20 years!



Anne was born in 1867 at the Jacobstow Rectory. She, Elizabeth and maybe some siblings spent

time with their Aunt Anne (Trelawney) and Uncle George Buckmaster Gibbons at the Lanteglos Rectory where they were listed as scholars on the 1881 census.

After Uncle George's death, Aunt Anne Gibbons moved to St Gennys farm and Anne and her siblings divided their time there and with a Trevigue farmer, Uncle Batchelor.

On the 1891 census she was staying in London. This is probably when she attended the Slade School of Art. She was an excellent artist specialising in seascapes. The family descendants had two seascapes; unfortunately they were lost in a house move. She also had her paintings exhibited in London where all the pictures were sold out. She was asked to do another but apparently said "I've done that, I don't need to do it again!"

The paintings of the Marhamchurch Angels were hung in December 1900, so I would imagine that the Angels of Jacobstow are from the same time as in the 1901 Census she is living in Stratton "working from home".

Then with a great sense of adventure in 1909, she is listed as entering Montreal. She joined her sister and brother who had already moved to Canada. She settled in Vancouver where she is listed as an artist and art teacher

Anne died age 96, April 1963 and in her obituary she is said to be a Christian Science practitioner and healer.




