Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 3rd October, 2023

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the Ordinary Meeting with five Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak, The Clerk and two members of the public attending Cornwall Council - Cornwall Council had approved Planning for Application No

PA23/05413 – Outline Planning for Agric. Workers dwelling - Land South of Tobarn, Jacobstow.

Village Parking etc - A Parishioner spoke to address her concerns regarding the parking and speed of vehicles around the school mornings and afternoons. Councillors said that the speed through the village will be reduced to 20mph sometime before 2025. Cllr. Chopak reported that the new lining at the Wainhouse Corner junction will not be done at the moment as there is no money to spend. This will be contracted out.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 7th November, 2023

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six Councillors, The Clerk and one member of the public attending.

<u>Penhallym</u> - It was reported that the access bridge at Penhallym has been cordoned off for some time. Clerk to write to English Heritage regarding repairing this. Many local people, dog walkers and visitors use this footpath.

<u>Footpaths</u> – Mrs Carter reported on the work that needs to be done on the footpaths. She also wishes to resign from being Footpath Coordinator. It was decided to ask Mr Chris Lloyd to report things that need doing, to the Clerk for discussion at the following Council meeting.

<u>D Day 6th June, 2024</u> – Lighting a Beacon was discussed. It was decided to put a note in the Journal asking if any Organization are interested in doing this for the Parish.

Edgar Road Closure- The new date for this closure is 13th November, 2023 – 26th January 2024.

<u>Parish Hall</u> - Clerk to contact the Parish Hall committee regarding installing Internet in the Hall. Parish Council would help to finance this.

<u>Wainhouse Corner Parking</u> - Complaints were received from Parishioners in respect of the Parking on the Canworthy Water road just off the A39. Cars park on the Junction to walk round to the Shop/Post Office or go to the Pub. Clerk to write to Highways to see if anything can be done to stop this parking.

Your MP Scott Mann - - This information is obtained from Scott's Facebook page

I have been talking to farmers, NFU reps and others across the St Tudy and Altarnun areas. Lots of feedback to take back to DEFRA Ministers about slurry pits, permitted development, environmental



regulations and much else besides. I also met with the Bodmin Chamber and other local representatives at Flory Restaurant and Cafe to discuss some exciting opportunities heading Bodmin's way. The food was great - do pay them a visit if you can! Many people rely on bus services across North Cornwall, to get to work or to see family and friends. That is why the Conservative Government have invested £3.5-billion in bus services since 2020, and now an additional £1,969,162 for services across Cornwall.

I cannot begin to imagine what it must be like for a family whose loved one takes their own life. Several constituents have contacted me during my time as your Member of Parliament to share their thoughts on the factors that led to the loss of their loved one, and see what me or the Government might be able to do to help. One area I have worked with the Government to try and change is the approach of Universities towards young people who suffer from mental health—issues whilst studying. I have met with campaigners and constituents directly affected by tragedy, and have written to Ministers extensively on the issue. I was grateful to receive a letter from Education Minister Robert Halfon MP. He confirms that he will commission a National Review of Higher Education Suicides with a view to forming future policies in this area.

WARNING FROM THE LONDON FIRE BRIGADE ON E BIKE FIRE

HAZARD.



We attended over 116 fires involving e-Bikes in 2022. The majority of fires related to e-bikes have happened in homes. These fires are often caused when charging batteries. Do not buy cheap alternatives. Please pay special attention to bike conversion kits. Do not attempt to modify or tamper with the battery. Always follow the



manufacturer's instructions. Reduce the risk of overheating. Batteries can get warm during their use. Allow them to cool down before attempting to recharge. Batteries should always be charged on hard flat surfaces where heat can dissipate. Batteries can also pose a risk if they have been damaged, so try to ensure they are not getting knocked around while in use or while being carried. Batteries should also never be exposed to extremes of temperature. Always follow manufacturers' instructions when charging. Never leave it charging unattended or charge it while you are asleep. You should always make sure you unplug your charger once it's finished charging. Always use the correct charger for your batteries and buy any replacements from a reputable seller. Never block your escape route with e-bikes. Store and charge them somewhere away from a main through route or exit. We know most people keep their bikes in the hall. Make sure you and your family have an escape plan in place in the event of a fire. Always call 999, never try to fight the fire yourself.

RESCUING HIGGY PIGGY

In half term I am invariably asked to look after my grandchildren. I decided to take them up the road to visit neighbours Jo and Steve to collect some cooking apples so we could make an apple crumble. Far more exciting than the apples was Jo's kind offer to see the ponies and then even better, to meet rescue hedgehog Higgy Piggy. He was found in the milking parlour with his dead sibling. They had become trapped and were starving. Jo took Higgy to Penbode Vets in



Bude who treated him free of charge for worms and gave Jo advice on hedgehog rescue services and how to care for hedgehogs. They gave her the leaflet in the



photograph. They estimated him as being about 4 weeks old and the advice was to care for him and feed him as he would need to reach 5 -600g in weight if he was to survive hibernation. Higgy Piggy is now growing and doing well. His home is a cat box in a stable on a mat and he is in a cardboard box filled with hay inside the cat box. My grandson Ethan was so taken by Higgy Piggy that he drew a picture as soon as we got home. Higgy Piggy has this name because one of

Jo's little relatives couldn't say the word hedgehog. Do not give hoglets milk as they are lactose intolerant. Higgy is fed 4 times a day.

LUSCIOUS LEFTOVERS

Whilst many of us enjoy cold meat and Bubble & Squeak with pickles on Boxing Day, why not try this easy, hot alternative for a change?

The recipe works really well with nut roast too.

Boxing Day Patties

Leftover Turkey Roast potatoes Cranberry Sauce

Pigs in Blankets Carrots Bread sauce or Mayonnaise
Stuffing Swede 1 Tbsp chopped fresh herbs
Chestnuts Peas 1 Tsp grated ginger (optional)
50g Cheese (any kind) Sprouts 1 Tbsp Flour seasoned with salt &

pepper

Estimate the quantities for the number of people you're serving.

Roughly chop the meat, sausages, stuffing, chestnuts and roast potatoes and mix together. Mash the remaining vegetables, add the cheese, herbs and ginger (if using) and mix well together. Add some bread sauce, mayonnaise or a little milk and butter to ensure the mixture sticks together without becoming too wet and sticky.

Heat the oven to 200°C (Fan oven 180°C). Form the mixture into small burger sized patties and roll in a little seasoned flour. Heat some oil in a frying pan and gently fry the patties in small batches for 2-3 minutes each side until golden. Transfer to a baking tray and place in the oven for 5-10 minutes. Serve with your choice of sauces, mayonnaise, chutney or sweet chilli sauce.

Christmas Ice Cream Sundaes

For 4 people:

85g leftover pudding or cake 8 scoops of ice cream your choice of flavours

410g tin of pears, chopped 25g chopped hazelnuts

3 Tbsp Pear juice or brandy or orange liqueur

For the chocolate orange sauce:

100g dark chocolate 1 Tbsp brandy, orange liqueur or orange juice

50ml double cream Zest of 1 orange

Grate a little chocolate for decoration and set aside. Melt the remaining chocolate in a saucepan. Add the rest of the sauce ingredients to the pan and heat gently, stirring continuously until it looks like a smooth, glossy sauce. Crumble the cake or pudding into 4 sundae glasses or dishes and drizzle with the alcohol or pear juice. Add the pear pieces and ice cream. Drizzle over the

chocolate sauce and decorate with the hazelnuts and grated chocolate.



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WEATHERWISE by Monitor

September is a late summer month this far west. Providing the remnants of tropical storms leave us alone it can be a pleasant month. This one got off to a good start, with very warm air being drawn up from the south for 10 days. Temperatures on most of the ten days were easily into the middle-twenties, with 28°C on the 7th. High humidities were observed for this period, and this did see some thunderstorm activity, with these migrating up from Brittany. The 6th saw one of these off the north coast of the Duchy by late pm, but it kept its distance and was short-lived. Humidity levels remained high, early mist most mornings, 25°C on the 8th, and 27°C on the 9th. A severe thunderstorm was observed Mid-Channel off Brittany late pm, it persisted for some hours but made no progress northwards just clipping the far south coast of Devon around 0100.

The 10th, 11th and 12th saw some light drizzle but only giving a small amount in the rain gauge here. Matters cooled somewhat by the 15th but still quite pleasant with light southerly winds and early mist and fog which cleared quickly by mid-morning. Late on the night of the 15th, a bright Aurora Borealis was widely observed generally in the country, with many reports in Cornwall as far south as Penzance.

Matters changed into the 16th, with rain from overnight into the morning with a depression tracking east along the Channel. High humidity along with marked upper air instability saw of number of thundery outbreaks to the south and east, rain generally inland and by the late evening severe thunderstorms were noted along the Channel towards the south east of the country. Conditions became more typical of September towards the end of the month, most days saw rain of sorts with some days still fairly warm.

A total of 3.62" of rain was collected here at Canworthy Water, typical of my 10 year average of 3.38".

October started off with fog on the 1st, and a thunderstorm at extreme range to the southeast mid-afternoon on the 2nd. Dense fog was observed on the 9th, the first few days following were generally dry although the 13th turned out quite wet with nearly 1" of rain collected from overnight. Still quite warm, some days getting to 22°C. A further thunderstorm was observed off the north coast late morning on the 19th, yet another thunderstorm to the south of Bodmin on the 23rd and the month then remained indifferent to the end with rain of sorts on most days.

October is a variable month for rainfall locally. I collected a total of 4.87", against my 10 year average of 4.23". It's like this generally, October, some years are on the dry side, some extremely wet. I haven't observed any real trend away from this in the past 10 years or so.

also always looking for adult help, so if you fancy having some fun with the next generations, let us know.





NEW HOUSING DEVELOPMENT

You may have seen a lot of activity on our new homes scheme at Edgar Road, Wainhouse Corner from Cornwall Rural Housing Association (CRHA). There are 13 new social rent homes on this scheme with a mix of properties including 2 x 1 bedroom bungalows, 2 x 1 bedroom houses, 1 x 2 bedroom bungalow, 5 x 2 bedroom houses and 3 x 3 bedroom houses. They are well insulated and sustainably heated using air source heat



pumps including underfloor heating. We are minimising environmental impact with extensive new planting using native plant species selected to encourage wildlife and bees to flourish. There will be low level solar powered street lighting to avoid excessive light pollution not interfere with any bat populations in the area. Feedback from our customers highlights the need for storage so rather than providing a garden shed we will be constructing a brick store to the larger properties for good, secure storage to keep bikes, surfboards, and garden equipment. We also intend to install smart home hubs and provide pergolas so our customers can enjoy their outdoor space.

We are aware that these homes will be in high demand. CRHA is a small housing association and rather than selecting applicants from the Cornwall Homechoice register, we maintain our own waiting list, so in order to be considered for one of these new homes, (due to complete in June 2024) local people should contact CRHA on 01208 892000. Alternatively, applications can be made via the CRHA website: www.crha.org.uk.

These homes are intended to be let to residents who have a local connection to the Parish and the guidance for this will be included in a planning document called a



S106 Agreement and CRHA will need to ensure it complies with the terms of this and its own Allocation Policy.

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GHOST STORIES

Hawker's Hut, Morwenstow, enchanting, historic, atmospheric, incredibly guirky, and perched on a cliff top with a dramatic sea view. Built by the eccentric Reverend Hawker in 1843 from shipwrecked timber and driftwood salvaged locally, this building material was collected personally by Hawker. It also has a turf roof, seats inside, and is partially built into the hillside. Rev. Hawker built this tiny hut as his personal sanctuary and spent hours writing there (including writing Cornwall's unofficial national anthem), watching the sea, as well as smoking opium!! Whilst Rev Hawker



was alive, visitors to his hut included Alfred Tennyson and Charles Kingsley. Rev Hawker strongly believed in the supernatural and demons and he was also said to have dressed as a mermaid and sat on the rocks of Bude. Is Hawker's Hut Haunted? – Some say yes! Could the very material the hut is made from be a possible source of haunting, due to the many bodies that washed up from these shipwrecks along the local coastline? People visiting the hut have said they have had possible paranormal experiences – could it be Rev Hawker himself, as he dearly loved this special hut and spent so much of his time here? The National Trust are now the custodians of this awesome little coastal structure and it is the smallest property they own. Much of the original material Hawker used to build the hut is still present. Definitely well worth the often 'wind swept' muddy walk - Hawker's Hut is accessible by a lovely coastal walk with stunning sea views once you are there. You could also take in the very haunted 13th century The Bush Inn and the ancient Grade 1 listed Parish Church of St Morwenna and St John the Baptist, which dates back to Norman times and contains items one thousand years old. A short walk from the Church leads to the ancient holy well known as St John's Well, located in the vicarage grounds. Many wreckers who washed up locally have been buried in unmarked graves at the Parish Church of Morwenstow, carried there by Rev Hawker himself. Both of these buildings and the Holy Well are approximately one mile walking distance from the hut and hugely worth a visit.

Several members took part in a County Craft day in October where we learnt how to make fabric origami Christmas trees and waxed flowers.


In November local artisan glass artist Gregg Anston-Race came to talk to us

and landscape. He demonstrated the different properties of glass when it is cut and brought with him many beautiful examples of his work which can be


seen in galleries across the UK as well as in his own

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
JACOBSTOW WALKING GROUP

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A huge THANK-YOU to Mary Carter by Anne Connolly



Anyone who has ever used a public footpath in Jacobstow, has Mary Carter to thank for it being open and accessible. Nearly thirty years ago, Mary discovered that many of the footpaths in the parish were disused or inaccessible. So with the help of a map, charting where the footpaths should be, and a few locals along the way, she started on her mission, involving many many miles of walking the routes of the footpaths and talking to lots and lots of people.

She contacted Cornwall County Council and with their help and funding, she started getting the many footpaths opened up and had stiles put in. On many of them are brass plaques with inscriptions that she and Mick put up for people to read as they crossed the stile. In addition to the mammoth job of

opening them up, Mary has also had the responsibility of organising their maintenance over the years. She recently secured funding from Cornwall County Council to replace many old stiles with either kissing gates or stiles incorporating dog-gates, which has made the footpaths even more accessible for so many more people.

Thanks to Mary, Jacobstow now has a network of user-friendly, well - maintained public footpaths, that connect to other parishes, such as Week St. Mary. She has also drawn a map of all the footpaths, copies of which are available in the church and old telephone box. Mary has worked tirelessly as Footpath Co-ordinator and is now stepping down from her unpaid role. She has left a lasting legacy for the people of Jacobstow and it is now up to us to use and enjoy what she has achieved over the last thirty years.

Your Parish council are working hard to keep our footpaths in the amazing condition that Mary has achieved. With this in mind if you come across any footpaths that you feel need to have our attention please report it to the Parish Clerk or any Village Councillor.

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CHRISTMAS PLANTS OUTSIDE AND INDOORS



The Christmas Rose (Hellebore Niger) is a hardy perennial evergreen plant with dark green leaves and white flowers. Useful for partially shaded areas, it thrives in rich, moist soil and attracts bees. Mulch each year with compost or manure and prune out older foliage to encourage new growth. It will self seed in

the right conditions but do be aware that It can be toxic to pets.

Holly is a favourite plant at Christmas but is also a useful evergreen behind summer planting, as a shrub or hedging plant. There are hundreds of varieties with different leaf variations and red, yellow or orange berries. Our common, native holly (Ilex Aquifolium) is especially good for Christmas decorations with its deep red berries.





Poinsettia plants are attractive houseplants with their dark leaves and bright red "bracts" that surround the small light green flowers in December and January. With care, they can be kept going after Christmas and even form new red bracts in time for next year. They need to be kept in a bright

spot but away from direct light and draughts, at around 13-15°C. Water sparingly and mist regularly. After Christmas feed monthly with a high potash liquid feed. Native to Mexico, they definitely don't like the cold so when buying them, avoid those being sold near to outside doors and any that are not in good condition as they are unlikely to thrive.

Amaryllis bulbs are also popular gifts and provide an exotic display when flowering in Spring. Water sparingly but regularly when the compost looks dry and keep in a warm, dark place away from direct heat. The flowers appear in around 6-8 weeks and last well - the stamens can be removed to prevent



pollen from staining furnishings. After flowering, remove the flower stalk at its base leaving the leaves to feed the bulb. Continue watering until August then give the bulb a dormant period. Water from mid-Oct to restart the process for another year. Keep out of reach of cats and dogs.

wouldn't come until I was asleep. Try some of these ideas:

- Get outside for a walk and if you can't do this, have a treasure hunt inside to get yourself tired but also relaxed.
- Avoid sugary things a few hours before bed. Sugar will keep you awake. Have a nice warm milky drink when you put milk and mince pies out for the reindeer.



- Try to keep to your normal routine (bath etc) even if you go to bed a bit later.
- Listen to a book or audio book and avoid screen time in your room so you are relaxed and ready for a cosy night's sleep.



Mick went to check and saw from the kitchen that there were flames coming from the flat roof where the repair had taken place. I tried to phone 999 but the land line didn't work. I used WhatsApp to phone Anne Connolly. Luckily a couple of days previously they had



added WiFi calling so Anne picked up my garbled call. The neighbours thought we were having a bonfire that had got out of hand. 3 fire engines, Holsworthy,



Bude,and Delabole arrived after a harrowing half an hour. We were pathetically trying to put the fire out with the garden hose. According to the fire officer everyone tries that. Steve and Anne were marvellous. Steve running up and down between the parish hall and church to find the fire hydrant. I had no idea where it was. Anne making tea and giving me her coat. It was incredible how fast the fire moved, the workshop was ablaze. The firemen had gone into our bedroom firing the hose through the window, also breaking a window in the big room to fire a jet of water onto the flat roof. This saved the house. Plus what has become a famous 133 year old red

door that held back the fire. The firemen were terrific. It became quite a party atmosphere once they had the fire under control. Anne and I were dishing out tea and anything suitable I could find to feed them. Chatting to the ones I knew as they were friends with my children. We had no electricity in the kitchen so the Connollys' again came to the rescue bringing extension cables and torches. Wadebridge firemen came to take over through the night. Especially for Mick. He's lost his workshop. And very frustrating as that's where we kept all our useful stuff. But the love and support we have been shown has been overwhelming. Everyone has been so kind, arriving with gifts, offers of help,



a meal cooked and delivered and a little maid drew us a lovely card that I've framed and put by the window. Advice:Shut your doors. The fire brigade have used our red door as an example. (See photo above) Hire good insurance assessors to deal with the insurance claim. Tell your insurance company only the minimum details. And the need to be extremely patient.
