

#### Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 7th October, 2025

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak, the Clerk and nine members of the Public attending.

Higher Meadow, Jacobstow – A presentation was given on a Community Garden Retreat at Eden Meadows. This is to create an eco retreat and training center that fosters health and wellbeing through nature based activities. Workshops will include Yoga, meditation, music, crafts and cookery.

<u>Planning Application PA25/05678</u> – Land East of Drumeagles, Jacobstow. Cornwall Council had refused this Application.

#### Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 4th November, 2025

Cllr Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with Three Councillors and the Clerk attending.

<u>Jacobstow Journal -</u> It was discussed and unanimously agreed to give a donation of £1,000 to the Journal fund. This to be paid from the Solar A/C.

<u>Planning Application No PA25/07280</u> - Change of use of rural barn to one self/custom build dwelling house together with associated orks. Councillors did not support this application as it is not providing any local need.

<u>Planning Application PA25/06108</u> - Part demolition and proposed change of use of Agricultural building to three Dwelling houses (Class 3) Councillors do not support this Application. The residential development is not suitable next to a large working dairy farm. They also have concerns regarding parking.

<u>Code of Conduct</u> – It was noted that all Councillors had completed the Code of Conduct training.

<u>Bus Shelter</u> - It was reported that one of the panes of glass in the Bus Shelter had been broken. Clerk to contact the Suppliers.

#### WINTER GARDENING & WILDLIFE

The mild autumn has meant we have seen many plants continuing to

flower well into November with roses and geraniums still going strong. As the weather cools, we can start to plan for Spring, planting bulbs for some early colour. They need good drainage so for pots use bulb compost or add lots of horticultural grit to potting compost when planting – a layer of grit just below the bulbs helps to prevents rotting. Pots can be brought



under cover or covered if the weather is very wet to stop the soil becoming waterlogged – or even washed away! If you find bulbs you've forgotten about or bought late bargain bulbs that are beginning to sprout, it is best to plant them and most will still flower even if planted late.

If you would like to enjoy Rhubarb from as early as February, try forcing a few of your crowns by placing a large bucket or pot over them in January. Cover in straw or compost and check after about 6 weeks to see if they are ready. These plants should not be forced again for at least 2 years so keep a record or photograph to identify them.

Leaves are an excellent soil improver once they have decomposed although this takes a while. If you don't have a separate heap or bin for them, they can help to aerate compost heaps and bins if added in small quantities mixed with other materials.

Leaves also provide great habitat for all sorts of wildlife over the winter so if you can, sweep them onto sheltered beds, under hedges and into corners and then tidy them up in the Spring. There are lots of berries in gardens and around the village which will help to support our garden birds over the winter along with the food on our bird tables and feeders.

There has been some unusual funghi to spot along the hedgerows recently, enjoying the wet conditions.

Septembers are supposed to be a late summer month this far west. It started badly, with an unsettled first week, over an inch of rain being collected here at Canworthy Water and on the cool side. Matters didn't improve into the next week either, the 7th saw light showers early, and a thunderstorm was observed at extreme range of sensors to the southeast mid-morning. There wasn't any activity locally, but some torrential downpours were noted off the north coast towards midday. Monday the 8th saw cumulus build-ups from late morning onwards with light passing showers, it didn't do anything until late afternoon when thunder was heard to the north of here, and a thunderstorm was noted tracking north of Bude which intensified and persisted for quite a while into North Devon by early evening. Further thundery activity was observed to the southwest on the following day, and also on the 11th early but was an isolated affair. Yet another storm was noted in the early hours to the northwest on the 13th. There was rain of sorts on all days in the first sixteen, and 5.46" of rain had been collected here by the 16th.

It wasn't until the 22nd that we had anything like a dry spell, which then persisted generally until the end of the month. Temperatures struggled to get to 18°C on most days, and a total of 6.74", 171mm was collected here against my 10 year average of 4.4", 112mm. We do get the odd wet Septembers, in recent years 2017 and 2019 were.

October started with a tropical storm remnant named "Amy" by the Met Office. Usually early season ones tend to be spent affairs by the time they reach us, but this one didn't, and was expected 944 Fair Isle by midnight on the 4th and developed worse than forecast. As can often be the case, ex-tropical cyclones tend to draw high pressure up in their wake, it did this time, but the pressure rise was quite rapid, winding the west to northwest winds up to gale force even inland on the 4th. Gusts in the afternoon along with a couple of spiteful squalls reached 45 knots here bringing down a couple of trees which were still in full leaf. Thunder was heard late morning in heavy rain showers. The storm caused considerable damage and disruption north of the 56° parallel and into the Northern Continent.

Thereafter matters settled down considerably. High pressure drawn in by the pressure void left by "Amy" gave a long spell of quiet conditions starting on the 5th, this persisted until the 18th. The final weeks of October were more seasonable, with rain most days and a thunderstorm to close the month on the 31st. A total of 4.82", 122.5mm of rain was collected here, against my 10 year average of 5.27", 134mm.

#### **Email Scams**

Here are some commons scams to be aware of:

Scammers can create fake websites that look official requesting you to provide personal or financial information. You might receive an email claiming to be from an organisation, like a bank, with a link to one of these fake websites. These are known as 'phishing emails'.

Some emails, known as 'spam' or 'junk', have a link or file attached for you to click on or open. Opening these links or downloading the files may be harmful to your device. Emails may trick you into thinking you've won a lottery or prize.

Someone might email you pretending to be someone you know who has been stranded somewhere and needs money.

Emails may even come from an email address that you recognise, such as a friend or family member. This can happen when someone's account is 'hacked'. If you receive something and it seems suspicious or out of character, give the person a ring to see if they sent it.

A phishing email claiming to be from HM Revenue and Customs (HMRC) offering you a tax refund if you enter your details. The real HMRC would never email to give you a tax refund.

If you receive a suspicious email, don't reply with your details or open any links or documents. Delete the email straight away and report it as spam through your email provider. If the email claims to be from an organisation, phone them directly using the phone number found on their official website and ask them.

Don't throw it away if it can be repaired!
This was the message from our speakers
Miranda Clarke and Alan Smith from Bude
Repair Cafe. Since opening in 2019, 33
sessions have been held, 554 items have been
brought in by over 100 people with 372 items

brought in by over 100 people with 372 items fully repaired. The items are triaged at Reception and referred to one of the 30

volunteer advisers who are keen to show how the repair is made to encourage self-help and to pass on their skills. Equally, they will advise if more specialist help is needed or if the item is irreparable. Customers can enjoy a free hot drink and cake while they wait and the Café also welcomes visitors without items for repair. The advisers often collaborate and share tools, there is no charge but customers are asked to pay for new parts and donations are welcomed. There

are approximately 3,740 Cafes worldwide with over an estimated 67,000 items repaired each month. The Bude Repair Cafe is open on the last Saturday of the month from 10am to 1pm at Neetside Community Centre.



#### Who doesn't need a cup of coffee to get them going in the morning?

Millie Gay, the Barista Trainer for The Cornico
Coffee Company intrduced us to this local,

#### New year, new you? (Perhaps for 30% of us!)

New Year's Resolutions often focus on our health - 39% in 2024 (YouGov). The challenge is to stick to these goals and 67% of us don't keep all our resolutions. Reasons vary but many of my clients with good intentions either can't get started or start strong then lose momentum and give up. Here are some tips to try when setting health goals:

Our brains perceive change as a threat as new things require new neural pathways and use more energy so initial resistance is just part of the process. With regular practice, new behaviours become more automated and very energy-efficient for the brain!

Be clear about why you want to achieve your goal and when motivation is waning, visualise the processes and outcome to focus on your core 'why'? For example, if weight loss is the goal, see yourself taking regular physical activity, making dietary change and imagine yourself at a healthy end weight.

Make the resolution a habit and identify your triggers using an "If...Then...

Because' sentence eg" If I feel stressed..Then I eat a donut/drink alcohol/ smoke or watch TV..Because it makes me feel relaxed/comforted". Replace your

response with one that helps you to keep to your goals – that gives you the



same 'Because' eg, eat healthy treats, go outdoors, meet friends, listen to music, try breathing exercises or meditation.

<u>Coach yourself!</u> Replace your inner critic - 'I knew I couldn't do it, I'm never going to be able to..' imagine your best friend saying this and respond as you would to encourage your friend.

View goal setting as an opportunity for growth,

seeing slip ups as opportunities to grow. Reward successes along the way not just at the end.

<u>Regularly reflect</u> upon your progress as we benefit from our experiences by reflecting on them and taking action based upon our reflections.

<u>View the goal setting process as flexible</u> – it's fine to adapt/change your plans and your goals/outcomes if appropriate.

Remember your "why" and take full ownership of it, rather than feeling you 'should' do something. We are more likely to succeed if we are fully invested. Use positive language as 'giving up' something, feels negative, replace it with 'I'm choosing to eat healthily and focusing on my health so that I can [insert your why]' is more empowering.

Enjoy it! Why not involve friends or family, join a class or a group online?

## How to make a Christmas Wreath for the birds in your garden

As the days get colder and snow starts to fall, our garden and countryside birds can struggle to find enough food and fresh water naturally. Providing bird food and clean water in the garden is an important way to help our friends over winter. And it will also give

you the chance to see these creatures up close and personal, including species, such as waxwings, that are only around in the winter months

You will need: pine cones, pliable twigs, soft lard, mixing bowl, holly and other leaves, bird seed, breadcrumbs, grated cheese dried fruits or unsalted nuts.

#### Method

- 1. Make a circle of twigs, twisting it together to form a circle.
- 2. Squish lard into a soft paste in a bowl. Put in bird seed, breadcrumbs or grated cheese.
- 3. Smear this mix over the pine cones and add dried fruit or nuts.
- 4. Attach the cones onto the ring with twisted wire, make sure all the ends of the wire are safely tucked away so they don't harm the birds.
- 5. Decorate with festive greenery and hang up in a tree in your garden where you can see the birds, but out of the way of cats and other predators.

#### 'The Secret River' by Kate Grenville

London, in 1806, William Thornhill works as a waterman on the River Thames. He is married to Sal, his childhood sweetheart, but life is very tough, so to make ends meet, he becomes involved in theft, is caught and then sentenced to transportation for life to New South Wales. He and his young family try to scratch a living from some land by the Hawkesbury River, building a makeshift house and planting crops. However, he and others like him do not expect the indigenous population to behave as they do, threatening them, stealing crops and household articles and setting fire to the land. As a reader you have divided sympa- thies for the Aboriginals, who


regard the land as sacred, and the deported convicts who have been placed somewhere they do not understand and are simply trying to survive. It is a very interesting and sometimes a very emotional read about Australian colonial history.

#### 'All the Colours of the Dark' by Chris Whittaker

A dark and gripping story about two childhood friends who live in the town of Monte Clare and their unending love for each other. Joseph Macauley, called Patch because of

what he wears over his missing eye, at the age of thirteen, prevents the abduction of a local girl and is taken instead. His friend, Saint, dedicates herself to find- ing him. Meanwhile he is being kept in a darkened room, where the voice of a girl he calls Grace talks to him and gives him hope. How- ever, when he is eventually rescued, there is no evidence to confirm that she actually exists. Patch, though badly traumatised devotes the rest of his life to finding her and any other girls, anywhere in the country, who have gone missing. Saint joins the police force and


searches for the abductor. This is mostly a tragic story but with moments of humour, both original and very moving.

#### TREASURY MEETING / CORNWALL FUNDING UPDATE

After agreeing to the meeting during my question in the House, I met with the Chief Secretary to the Treasury alongside other Cornish MPs to demand clarity on what happens when the Shared Prosperity Fund ends in March.

We spoke about the real impact this funding has had across Cornwall, having supported countless local businesses like WATT Electric Vehicles, Bude Cleaner Seas Group, community projects, organisations, and much more.

Cornwall needs clarity, and long-term investment. We made the case that the return on spend in Cornwall is very strong, and I am pleased to say the Minister was in listening mode and understood what amazing potential Cornwall has.

I also raised the Family Farm Tax, urging officials to rethink the

policy and instead adopt alternative proposals, such as those by CenTax and the NFU, which would actually raise more revenue but protect those family farms being put at risk.

I'll keep working hard cross-party to ensure our Duchy gets the funding it desperately needs and deserves at the Budget in just a few weeks.
