<u>Editorial</u>

The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 3rd Tuesday of every month (except, usually, for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 in Winter months and 8 pm in the Summer. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

<u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council Meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the Minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall Notice Board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 19th April 2011

- <u>Local Maintenance Partnership</u> Cornwall Council had offered the usual grant towards footpath maintenance. This to be passed to Mrs Mary Carter to be agreed and signed in the normal way.
- <u>Bus Shelter at Wainhouse Corner</u> St Gennys PC had replied saying they may be interested in sharing the cost of a Bus Shelter if we supply figures. Cllr Phil Tucker would see if there are any grants available.
- Highway Issues Oliver Jones, Area Highway Manager, replied to the list of possibilities the Parish Council had put to him. Jacobstow a) A footpath from Cory Close to main road will be added to Traffic Request List if and when funding becomes available (Add to Parish Plan at first opportunity). b) The existing 30mph restriction meets current Dft criteria, this is mainly due to the lack of continuous development that is required for a 30mph restriction to be extended. c) Verge ploughing will be arranged. d) Publicly maintainable highway adjacent to Almar and adjoining properties does not go beyond the white line (shown on photograph). e) Relocation of existing give way sign and removal of junction markings, this will be added to the Post April programme of works. g) Jacobstow village sign will be relocated. h) Highway drain opposite "Southcott Meadow" remedial measures have been undertaken. Parish to confirm problem has been resolved following the next considerable rainfall. i) School 20mph this remains a priority for the Council and will be implemented once schools fronting A and B roads have been completed. Wainhouse Corner a) Regarding the existing 40 mph restriction this was assessed under the A & B road speed limit review. The recommendation was that there are not enough frontages for this section to be considered a village and the 40mph speed limit should remain in place. b) Road marking on the A39 through Wainhouse Corner renewal works are on the Post April works programme. c) Traffic Islands, these are usually associated with pedestrian crossing facilities where a controlled crossing is not feasible.
- <u>Parish Plan</u> Final matters on the Parish Plan were discussed, being Social Network & Activities, Young People, Parish Regeneration and Housing & Planning. Discuss at the local Coffee morning where a public seat should be put also where to relocate the Jacobstow Village sign. Ask Journal to get suggestions for a place for a seat in their next issue.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 19th April 2011 (contd.)

<u>Speedwatch</u> – Mr Adey gave the usual Speedwatch report saying there is a five week work routine. <u>Planning Application</u> - Mr James Davison – siting of a 4Kw photovoltaic array to generate renewable electricity at North Broompark, Week St. Mary. Mr Davison explained what this involves and Councillors unanimously supported this application.

<u>Declaration of Interest</u> – Mr D Adey declarared an interest in Item 11 on the Agenda and accordingly left the room.

<u>Planning Application</u> – Mr & Mrs P Heneghan – Single Storey dwelling at Little Beckaveans, Jacobstow. Councillors do not support this Application because of inadequate visibility to the right for traffic emerging from the application site. Also the proposed dwelling would result in loss of outlook and would be harmful to the residential amenity of neighbouring dwellings.. Correspondence from Mrs Heneghan – Councillors had a full and frank discussion on the points

raised by Mrs Heneghan. Hedgerows are only allowed to be cut after the 15th July each year. The one way system is not possible as buses could not operate this system. The 30mph is not viable as there isn't enough continuous houses as stated above in the Area Highway Manager's report.

<u>Donations</u> – Donations amounting to £390 received from Parish Plan Committee.

<u>Planning</u> – Mr Denzil Phillips – Mr Phillips explained what alterations he intends to do at New With even, Jacobstow. He is hoping to build six new bedrooms, two being respite rooms. Also five self contained lodges. Planning Application will be received in due course.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 17th May 2011

As this was the Annual General Meeting it began with the election of Officers.

<u>Chairman</u> – Re-election of Chairman, Mr. Norman Osborne, Proposed Mrs. C. Smith, Seconded Mr. D. Adey.

<u>Vice-Chairman</u> – Re-election of Vice-Chairman, Mrs. C. Smith. Unanimous decision. <u>Responsible Financial Officer</u> – Re-election of Mrs. D.A. Turner. Unanimous decision.

<u>Nursery</u> – Noted that The Jacobstow School Nursery is now up and running with 11/12 children. <u>Parish Plan</u> – Make amendment to Parish Plan regarding pathway from Cory Close to A39 at earliest opportunity.

- <u>Western Greyhound</u> Clerk to ring Western Greyhound to explain we do not need more buses but could the buses already running go through Jacobstow village.
- <u>Traffic Calming</u> Write letter to Oliver Jones asking for a quote for two signs saying 'Welcome to Jacobstow Please drive carefully' and on the reverse 'Thank you for driving carefully'. These to be put on the approach to Beckaveans Farm and the other on the approach to Trefrida Farm. Ask if a 'Slow' sign could be attached to the existing post of the 'Bend' sign in village approaching Penhallym Cottage.
- <u>Information available on Notice Board</u> Discussion held on changes to be made to the Information Available on Notice Board.
- <u>Parish Footpaths</u> Mrs Sarah Smith showed Councillors leaflets she had made showing a map (drawn up by the Footpath Co-Ordinator, Mrs. M Carter) of all the Parish Footpaths. Mrs Smith to get prices for printing leaflets which could be put in various places i.e. Post Office, Petrol Station, Pub, Church etc.
- <u>Audit</u> The Audit form, Statement of Accounts Section 1 was completed by the Responsible Financial Officer and signed. The meeting approved the Accounts and these were signed by the Chairman. Section 2 Annual Governance Statement was completed on behalf of the Councillors and signed by the Chairman and the Clerk.
- <u>Cornwall Council</u> Renewable Energy Conference & Exhibition will be held at the former Gaia Centre, Delabole on the 29th July 2011.

Just in case you haven't heard there is a new preschool at Jacobstow Community Primary School. We are open Tuesday 9am to 12noon, with an optional lunch club 12noon - 1pm, Wednesday 9am - 3pm and Friday 9am -3pm.

We accept children from 3yrs of age, who are in receipt of nursery funding. For those who don't know all 3 and 4 year olds are entitled to 15 hrs free preschool education for

38 weeks of the year following their 3rd birthday. If you wish to apply for funding you need to contact a preschool provider who will give you the information. Our aim is for your child to have fun and learn though play in a safe, caring and happy environment.

By joining in with school assemblies and other school activities we hope that when the time comes for your child to move into full time schooling the transition will be as happy and stress free as possible for both your child and you. We can take up to 16 children and have some places available.

On Tuesday afternoons 1.15pm to 3pm there is a stay and play afternoon, open to all children from birth to 5years, (cost 50p per child). This is a good chance to have a "taster" and meet some of the other children and parents.

JACOBSTOW SCOUTING NEWS.

Last term the Cubs learnt how to keep themselves safe, on busy roads, in farm yards and on beaches. They had to consider how to behave sensibly in cars, know how to make emergency calls and set up a Fire Drill for their own home. Do you all know how to get out of your house and where to meet, in the event of a fire in the middle of the night? Our Community Policeman made a friendly visit to discuss what we had learnt.

We went back to basics, knots, tracking, The Jungle Book and Kim's Game. Then we were busy cracking codes, writing in invisible ink, semaphore, sign language and using the Phonetic alphabet: Charlie, uniform, bravo etc.

At the end of term, the Cubs considered the real meaning of Easter by making Easter Gardens, as well as enjoying eggs.

In mid May we were off to camp at Woodlands in South Devon and had a wonderful time enjoying all the rides and attractions. The Cubs behaved beautifully, played well, ate well, slept well. What more can you expect!

In the Spring the Scouts were busy cooking. We had Haggis on Burn's night, with dancing and poetry of course. They cooked Egg noodles for the Chinese New Year and we had a Ready, Steady, Cook evening where the Scouts produced delicious dishes using potatoes, carrots, onions, peppers, tuna and cheese. Later they became creative, painting plates, sweet making and problem solving.

In the Summer, they built shelters and slept on cardboard.

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County Councillor Report by Cllr Phil Tucker

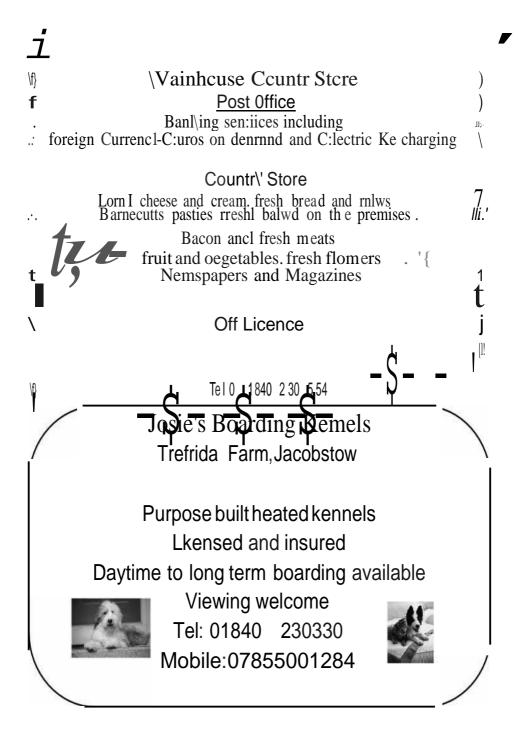
Planning decisions.

It seems that the planning decisions are often the opposite of the wishes locally. When local people oppose an application the planning officers want to pass it. When an application is supported locally the planners want it refused.

Planners seem to reference planning documents when it suits them and ignore them when not. I have recently had an application on which was very high visibility on the cliffs at Crackington, right in the heart of the AONB where planners didn't even ask for their views and another application which was low visibility right on the boarder of the AONB and tucked into the hedge where planners refused the application mostly on the grounds of it being in the AONB. I am finding this very frustrating. The officers say that they are maintaining a standard approach to planning. I think that I am seeing a 'pick 'n mix' attitude to the policies and which to apply (or not) with each application. Enforcement is sometimes worse, one person is administrated quickly and forcibly, while others are not. This is not linked to public complaints indeed it seems often to be inverted response. Where, for instance, many people have objected over a building which is built too high (usually by a large developer) and it has increased blocking of their light, the planners have allowed the property to remain. Where there has been no complaint and the digression is less, the planning department have insisted that the building is removed and frankly hounded that individual.

In your home you should expect light or space and protection from this diminishing from a new or altered property being built. Planning permission was started to protect communities from unreasonable structures and to protect the weaker community members from the oppressive or perhaps we could call them aggressive developers. My recent experience is that this is now exactly what we don't have. We do seem to have large well financed developers running our communities and making our planning departments scared to oppose them. Some think that the situation is made worse when agents and developers put their applications forward in, what is termed in the business, "pre-application talks". This is prior to an application where no one else might be able to put a reasoned defence of the application. At this meeting the officer will ask the prospective applicant to address certain issues prior to application. The problem then is how the officer addresses other issues raised either by the elected councillor or by the community after the actual application has been made. Has the officer decided an application before it goes to consultation, actually before there is an actual application and have they pre-determined themselves by hearing just one side of the argument? You might think so, I couldn't possibly comment!

Eden bucks the trend

Exciting news! JAF (Jesus and Fun) at Eden has broken the trend! At a time when other church memberships are declining and churches are closing, twelve people were brought into membership of the Methodist Church on Sunday May 1st, with the service being led by Rev. Doreen Sparey-Delacassa. Eden is an isolated, rural church at Headon Cross, Jacobstow, Bude and draws its congregation from a wide area of scattered hamlets and villages. In the 1990s, when services ceased at Eden, the building was kept and refurbished by the circuit for youth work. JAF started as a children's club at Canworthy Water Methodist Church in November 2004. After three years it outgrew the Sunday school room there and, following a Cliff College Mission, moved to Eden. At first, family services were introduced once a month, the children's club continued and a weeknight youth club began. Over the last four years the work at Eden has developed, and now a variety of worship services are held for all ages, every Sunday at 10.30am.

A LIFE OF CRIME As Lived by Mignon Warner Creator of the Mrs Charles Mysteries

'I hold up my hands, I dunnit, Officer! I have lived a life of crime ever since I was six years old and am still living it, every day.'

It is true that my life of crime began in earnest at the age of six. How? I was accused of a crime I did not commit, was never believed that I was completely innocent, and the injustice of it haunts me to this day. I did not fear the threat of the police, or their lie detector test my mother threatened me with if I did not tell the truth, because I *was* telling the truth. The heinous crime of which I stood accused? A savage rip down the front of the class bully's – a boy – jumper of the sort one could only have imagined had resulted from a fierce wrest-ling match with a lion. But for some curious reason, the boy pointed the finger at me, the charge stood and the lion walked free. From that incident on, my fate was sealed. Crime and the setting to rights of the injustices often inherent in it would be my pathway through life.

Interviewed by a Bideford local radio presenter some years ago, I further laid the blame for my life of crime on the childhood night terrors I suffered which, I like to think, I would not have survived had it not been for my younger sister's love of wicked witch stories. Ten was the price I had to pay for being permitted to share her bed, and the comfort of her nearness, all such stories needing to be made up as I went along in order for me to make it through the night. I usually got off lightly. Three were the most I can remember ever having to think up before my sister, thankfully, drifted off to sleep. This intense fear I endured as a child of the scary moving shadows cast on the wall by the trees standing beyond my bedroom window, and of the intensely alarming things that went creak and bump in the night, were also defining influences on my writing.

The one thing that, for me, writing crime fiction could never be called is a hobby. It is an obsession. The smallest incident during the day that might strike me as being a little unusual – something I have read in a newspaper, or a conversation with someone I have met while out walking with my two greyhounds – can trigger a train of thought that always begins with 'what if...?'. The '*what if*' always dragging me along the same dark, scary pathway where ultimately a crime will be committed.

Writing is a lonely profession with few exciting moments, certainly in my lifetime of writing crime fiction, that are memorable. Being accepted as a member of the prestigious Mystery Writers of America, and invited by a visiting group of American fans of my Mrs Charles mysteries as one of their UK crime fiction writer-guests at a London hotel luncheon, were definitely the most outstanding.

Another highlight was being invited to discuss my work with the late, third Lord Hardinge of Penshurst, himself an author of crime novels under the pen name of George Milner, who was at that time crime fiction editor at the book publishers, Macmillan.

I have met quite a few crime fiction writers, but the one who stands out in my memory is the late Alan Hunter, creator of the Inspector George Gently series of crime novels, a number of which have recently been televised by the BBC starring Martin Shaw. I met Mr Hunter at a literary luncheon and after introductions, he sat opposite me in a position where conversation with him became impossible and casual observation was all that was available to me. As a reader and fan of the George Gently novels, the physical resemblances, and one particular mannerism of Alan Hunter and his literary creation, were astonishing. In fact, rather disturbing. I wonder... Do people look at me and see Edwina Charles? Dear me. A frightening thought!


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You and your Dog in the countryside

This is the time of year when we all enjoy the sights and sounds of lambs and calves in the fields. We should always be aware that most young animals have a protective mother somewhere close by. It is a good idea to remember this when you are enjoying the lovely countryside and fields surrounding our village with your dog, and maybe exercise a bit more caution when approaching farmland. It could be that the field which the footpath goes through looks empty, so you would let your dog run off the lead, only to discover that there is another part of the field, previously not apparent to you, that has got livestock in it, maybe even young. According to Cornwall County Council the countryside code states that "by law you must control your dog so that it does not scare or disturb farm animals or wildlife. On most areas of open country and common land, known as "access land" you must keep your dog on a short lead between 1 March and 31 July - and all year round near farm animals. Take particular care that your dog doesn't scare sheep and lambs, or wander where it might disturb birds that nest on the ground and other wildlife eggs and young will soon die without protection from their parents"

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The Garden Spot by Bob Rudd

Early June is the ideal time to sow winter Pansies, Polyanthus, Wallflowers, Sweet Williams and Icelandic Poppies in pots for a good show in the cold months. You can also plant Anemones to flower in the Autumn, you should soak the tubers overnight and then plant them 3 to 4 inches deep. Early flowering plants should be pruned back now examples being Philadelphus. Deutzia and Kolkwitzia, prune as low as possible taking out the old wood. On the vegetable front be aware of the carrot fly, the best method of combating this pest is to put a barrier about 18 inches high around your crop. Don't forget to put collars around your cabbages, these need to be about 6 inches square with a slot and small hole for the stem of the plant. July is the time to divide and plant flag Irises, dividing flags should be done every 3 - 4 years because the centre tubers give less flowers. Early flowering Geraniums, Violas and Delphiniums can be cut right down to just above the ground. Feed and water them and you may be lucky and get a second show. Back to the Veg plot, watch out for tomatoes getting blossom end rot, avoid this by keeping the roots moist at all times and shading your glass. The onion tribe need to be fully baked in the sun before harvesting and left on the garden to dry. I have been asked for advice on Rhubarb, if your plants are not producing many decent stems, wait until winter, dig up the weakest plant and let the frost attack them, early next year look at the root, cut out the old part and replant



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An Interview with Norman Osborne Chairman of Parish Council

Norman and Sue Osborne and their family came to Jacobstow twenty four years ago, on December 1st 1987. The move was quite an event as they were moving not just a house but a complete farm. Norman told me that they had wanted to increase the size of their farm and Jacobstow offered everything they were looking for. Their stock at the time included a herd of one hundred dairy cows. On the day of the move the cows were milked in Warwickshire in the morning before being loaded onto the transport and were then milked in the evening in Cornwall, quite an undertaking. The move to Cornwall provided no great changes, although Norman said he had not expected the difference in weather! The average annual rainfall in Warwickshire was 26 inches compared with 55 inches in Cornwall. He said that this year has been exceptionally dry and the April warmth has meant that the Osbornes have been able to cut for silage two weeks earlier than normal.

Since his retirement, Norman and Sue live at the top of the village at Tregenna Close; he told me that the management of the farm is entirely in the hands of his two sons. He was quite content to relinquish the decision making but, despite this, Norman continues to work on the farm. He is usually up early to help in the dairy. You may also catch him out and about on the farm during the day. He believes that the main change he has seen in farming relates to greater specialisation, few farmers are generalists now. Tobarn is also very much a family concern and they do not employ any extra help. Even with modern technology the commitment to caring for a herd of two hundred and fifty and milking twice a day is a big responsibility.

Both Norman and Sue enjoy the company of their grandchildren; their five granddaughters live in Jacobstow and their daughter's family live in Dubai, where they have two young grandsons. They visit Dubai as often as they can. Sue always goes over for her grandsons' birthdays.

When he is not busy at home or on the farm Norman has other duties on Jacobstow Parish Council. He has been a member of the Parish Council for the past sixteen years and Chairman for the last ten. He told me that his interest in Jacobstow and its community led him to becoming a member of the Parish Council. The Parish Council is the first level of local government and Norman believes that as such it has an important role both as a mouthpiece for the Parish and a first line resource when needed.

An example of this was the need for flood relief at the time when Boscastle and Crackington were the centre of attention. In his role as Chairman of the Parish Council Norman was able to gain the attention of North Cornwall Council to alert them to the dangerous situation in this Parish. (contd. on Page 31)

INTERVIEW WITH NORMAN OSBORNE (contd.)

The role of the Parish Council and its Chair has become more complex and the many local government changes have increased bureaucracy. Norman believes that it is essential for Parish Councillors to be transparent in their actions and thus the rules and regulations in the area of the Code of Conduct are very important. He said this can sometimes prove complicated as people living in a small parish know each other very well; Parish Council members have to be particularly circumspect in their declaration of interest. The other area which now receives ever closer scrutiny is the use of monies assigned to the Parish Council for the Parish. It seems the legacy of those in power who have abused the expenses system has filtered down to increase the rules and regulations at the lower levels of local government. The overall responsibility for finances rests with the Chairman and this is a role which Norman takes very seriously.

Norman is contented with his life here. He believes that village life is about being part of a small community and knowing your neighbour. He enjoys the fact that he is likely to be approached by friends and acquaintances where ever he is. When he has spare time Norman likes to walk the coastal footpath, so if you recognise him on one of those walks, stop and have a word.

Recipe of the Month by Marion Reason

Cheesy Vegetable Bake

Ingredients

1pt cheese sauce – either bought or homemade A mixture of any pre-cooked veg:

Carrots, swede, parsnip, beans (runner or broad), sprouts,

Cabbage, broccoli, cauliflower, asparagus, leeks, peas etc. Grated Cheese



To the vegetables add enough cheese sauce to cover all the veg after mixing. Put into an oven-proof dish. Sprinkle with grated cheese and bake for 45-60mins. 200degC, 400degF, Gas Mk 6

Variations

- 1. Use any tinned beans (without a sauce) or chickpeas to make enough of leftover veg.
- 2. If you have leftover cooked potatoes slice and place them on top and put grated cheese over the potatoes.
- 3. Instead of a cheese sauce mix the following:-a can of chopped tomatoes, 3 tsp tomato puree, 4 tsp chopped parsley, 1 clove crushed garlic, salt & pepper.

Do you want the children to help make tea?

Prepare the vegetables the day before (or make sure you have enough leftovers) and either make the cheese sauce or buy a carton. When you are ready to make it let the children mix the vegetables together, add the cheese sauce and sprinkle on the grated cheese. Simple!

IMPORTANT. Either Mum or Dad must put it into the oven and take it out again after cooking.
