The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 3rd Tuesday of every month (except, for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 in Winter months and 8 pm in the Summer. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

Editor's Note *The report on each month's Parish Council Meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. We have omitted certain minor items for brevity but a full version of the Minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall Notice Board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting.*

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 15th April, 2014

- 1) Mr Norman Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with a full attendance of Councillors and two members of the public.
- 2) **Planning Application – Mr B Heal** - It was noted that Cornwall Council had refused planning as it represents a dwelling outside the defined development limit for Jacobstow.
- 3) **The Kresen Kernow project** - Cornwall Council are building a new archive and local studies centre for Cornwall. The building will bring together the collections of the Cornwall Record Office, the Cornish Studies Library and Cornwall and Scilly Historic Environment Record.
- 4) **Audit** - The Audit form was completed by the Responsible Financial Officer and signed. The meeting approved the Accounts and these were signed by the Chairman. The accounts will now be checked by the Internal Auditor before being sent to the External Auditor.
- 5) **Open Meeting for Big Field Wind Farm** – A discussion took place regarding the Drop-In session for Parishioners to be held on the 26th April 2014.
- 6) **Planning Appeal - Mr Barry Sobey** – It was noted that a Planning Appeal had started regarding the siting of a caravan for residential purposes on land West of Witheven Farm, Jacobstow, Bude. Councillors agreed to support the recommendation of Council Officers.
- 7) **Village Web Site** – Mrs Sarah Smith looking into the possibility of having a Village Web Site.

A very well attended extra meeting of the Parish Council was held on Tuesday 29th April to discuss the planning application for the Big Field Wind farm at Week St Mary. After an evening of lively discussion involving representatives from Good Energy, the Parish Council and our Councillor Nicky Chopak, the Council voted not to support the application.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 20th May, 2014

Mr Norman Osborne chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with a full attendance of Councillors, Cllr Nicky Chopak and one member of the public. Apologies received from Jacobstow Journal members.

As this was the Annual General Meeting the Meeting began with the election of Officers:- Re-Election of the Chairman, Mr N Osborne, Re-Election of Vice-Chairperson, Mrs C Smith, Re-Election of the Responsible Financial Officer, Mrs D Turner. All Unanimously agreed.

Review of Polling Districts etc – *A review is being carried out, Councillors agreed that no change needs to be made in our Parish.*

Parish Information Available Notice Update - *This was discussed by Councillors. Clerk to update as necessary.*

Mobile Library – *Consultation taking place as to the future of the mobile library.*

Insurance – *The insurance premium is due to be paid and it was agreed to get an alternative quote.*

Allocation Scheme Review & Consultation - *New legislation from Central Government means that Local Authorities can now make changes to their schemes such as who can qualify to join the Housing Register. These changes will help Cornwall Council and Cornwall Housing Ltd to better manage the housing waiting lists by making sure that the social houses that are available go to those families and individuals that are in the greatest need.*

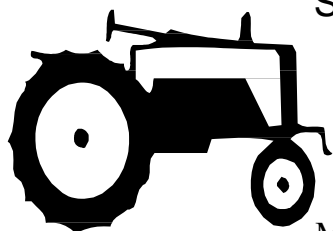

‘Superfast?’ Broadband!



Progress is being made at Canworthy Water. Traffic lights have been installed and our roving reporter has been assured that the wiring is being laid for fibre optic broadband. For further information check on the BT



website www.bt.com/infinity. Another good website to use is www.cable.co.uk.

We have received an update from Dan Rogerson, with a copy of a letter he has received from Openreach as below:

“Dear Mr Rogerson,

Thank you for your e-mail of 11 March to Clova Fyfe on behalf of your constituent, Sarah Smith, regarding the availability of Superfast Fibre Optic Broadband in her area. I welcome the opportunity to respond and apologise for the delay in doing so.

The area, Middle Southcott to Jacobstow is served by St Genny’s exchange cabinet WW/SGEN 2. This cabinet has been upgraded for fibre broadband by the Superfast Cornwall broadband project and not as part of the Openreach commercial rollout of fibre broadband.

I should explain that the issue of some constituents not being able to access fibre broadband is technical rather than commercial. The cabinet is located outside the Old Post Office, Wainhouse Corner, near Bude. The cable distance from this cabinet to the properties in Jacobstow is on the upper technical limits to which fibre broadband service can operate. Generically, fibre broadband, albeit at relatively low speeds, is available to the constituents of Jacobstow. However, each resident requiring fibre broadband would need to enter their details into a Service Provider’s checker, to ascertain whether service is available at their specific property. If available, this should also provide an indication of the approximate speeds they can expect.

The Superfast Cornwall team is responsible for all aspects of fibre broadband provision in Cornwall. If your constituent requires further details about fibre broadband in this area, I would suggest that she contacts the project team via the following link: <http://www.superfastcornwall.org/>

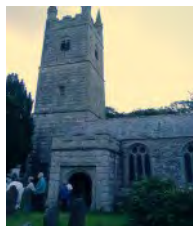

BOB'S GARDENING SPOT

You need to be aware of keeping your ground moist because plant's absorb food with their water uptake. So, water and mulch your ground with chipped bark or anything similar, grass clippings will do the job, but be aware not too deep. Any gaps in your border can be filled with bedding plants as the season progresses.



You should be mowing your lawn at least once a week with the mower set fairly low to give about half an inch cutting height. Tie in rambling and climbing roses and try to train them as horizontally as possible to slow the flow of sap and get more flowers. On shrub roses watch out for suckers growing on grafted roots, dig out the soil around the sucker and pull off the sucker, then back fill the soil.

Cut back faded flowers on perennials as this encourages new growth and more flowers during the summer. For example, Delphiniums can be cut right back to encourage new shoot's and more flowers. Hardy Geraniums can be cut down to ground level.

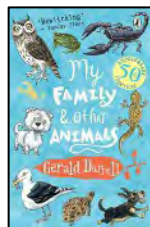
On the veg front – keep your runner beans well watered. Put a handful of Hydrate Lime in a 2 gallon watering can and water the base of the plants and it will help your beans set flowers and you will get more beans.

Marions Cookery Corner

Please be aware this recipe uses raw eggs

Strawberry & Clotted Cream Semifreddo



Ingredients

7-8 oz Strawberries

3 large free range eggs

9oz clotted cream

3tsp lemon juice

3½ oz caster sugar

3 ½ oz double cream

Method

Blitz half of the strawberries in a blender with 1 tsp lemon juice. Pass this through a sieve to remove the pips. Finely chop the other half of the strawberries.

Separate the eggs. Add the sugar to the yolks and whisk for about 5 minutes until the mixture is pale, thick and mousse like.

Whisk the egg whites with 2 tsp lemon juice.

In another bowl mix the double and clotted cream together then whisk to soft peaks, DO NOT over beat.

Fold the cream into the egg yolk mixture followed by the strawberry coulis, then gently fold in the egg whites, a third at a time then add the chopped strawberries.

Using mini loaf tins or one large one, pour in the mixture, cover with cling film and freeze for 6 - 8 hours.

Take from the freezer 15 minutes before serving, you may need to run a knife around the edge of the tin to turn out.

Serve with extra strawberries and coulis or on its own. Make with any summer berries but only coulis half of the fruit and have the rest whole or chopped depending on the size of the fruit

WEATHERWISE by Monitor

March, thankfully, was a lot quieter than usual - the first week being fairly normal for the time of year, (if anything weather wise is normal these days!), with only a couple of wet days (1st and early on the 2nd being dry, then two heavy rain periods up to the morning of the 3rd).



No rainfall was then recorded at Canworthy Water of any significance until the 20th. The total for the month was 3.12", about average for the area generally. Of note was the lack of severe gales, and no heavy rain and hail showers, at least locally.

Quite a few days were warm, I noted the 9th and 30th reached 17°C , with a 14°C in the afternoon. Thunder was heard, however, early on the 22nd, with high instability observed during the late afternoon but no further activity.

April again was fairly quiet. The only really wet day was on the 26th, with just over 1" collected here in 24 hours to the 27th, which was quite cold. Rainfall was limited, the wet day being on the 20th - nothing was collected here since the 8th, in fact. The total for the month was 3.52". Again, no gales observed, and I didn't record any frost this month other than a light touch overnight on the 19th. A thunderstorm was observed to the south-east in the afternoon of the 28th, it was at about 25 miles distant and didn't move during It's duration. Sea-breeze effect of the Channel, I would suspect.
