#### Editorial by Sarah

A friend of mine looked at a bungalow for sale on the coast road at Widemouth. She went to the estate agents to get the details, the agent told her "It's on the market for  $\pounds 500,000$ , with planning permission for a new two storey house to be built in its place." Let's just take a minute to digest this information,  $\pounds 500,000$  for a house that you are going to demolish, then pay however much to build a new one in its place, the world of property has truly gone mad.

We all gnash our teeth and moan about how young people can't get on the property ladder, which does seem an unachievable ambition. But is it? Is the reason they can't get a deposit for a mortgage because house prices are just too high, or is it because they are not committed to saving? If you compare modern wages to ones in the 1980s and 1990s percentage wise, where we were asked to save a huge amount of our wages for a deposit? Other aspects of the housing market are also completely out of wack; it would be interesting to find out how many of the houses on the new Binhay development opposite Morrisons are owner occupied. Not many I bet, but the amount of rent they are asking is probably over and above what you would repay for a mortgage, but we are back to the old chestnut of who can afford a mortgage.

We live in a beautiful part of the world and that is reflected in our property prices, again we moan about how expensive property is, but are you about to sell your house below market value because a local wants to buy it? Of course you aren't because you can bet your bottom dollar the people who are selling you your next house aren't going to make the same concession! The other constant thorn in our side is second home owners, again would you not sell your house to a Londoner, knowing it's going to be a second home or holiday let? What impact does this have on villages that are ghost towns in the winter when all the cottages are packed up at the end of the season? Maybe St Ives had the right idea, but that is only stopping new second home development, nothing stopping a local selling their established home to a townie! Umm food for thought...

The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 1st Tuesday of every month (except for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 pm. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes. <u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council Meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the Minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall Notice Board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting.

#### Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 5th April 2016

Vice-Chairperson Cllr.Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with three Councillors, County Councillor Nicky Chopak and four members of the public attending.

- 1) Community Benefit Fund The necessary claim form and policy was discussed and agreed the Clerk would send a copy to all Councillors to read and then discuss at the next meeting.
- 2) Planning Application PA16/02485 Mr A Piper Outline permission with all matters reserved. Proposed residential development. Land East of Oakdene, Edgar Road, Wainhouse Corner. Councillors support this application on the understanding that there is a minimum of 50/50 on affordable houses, preferably for rent.
- 3) Planning Application PA16/02941 Mr N Watson Formation of new garage/home office/studio at Trelinney, Broad Langdon, Jacobstow. Councillors support this application.
- 4) The Big Field Wind Farm Mr John Colombi It was noted that the Appeal date is 26<sup>th</sup> April, 2016. Clerk to Email an objection mentioning the noise level and flicker would be greater with the larger blades and the fact that local people have not been consulted regarding the new proposals. Also it should be a new application because of the changes.
- 5) CALC It was agreed to pay the sum of £223.40 to CALC being £204 annual membership and £18.80 for the up to date Councillors Guide purchased for each Councillor. Proposed we pay Cllr. Adey, Seconded Cllr. R Reason.
- 6) Councillor Matters The question of litter from Wainhouse Corner to Eden Chapel was discussed. As well as rubbish there were a significant amount of cans and alcohol bottles. These had all been picked up by a young mother.

#### Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 3<sup>rd</sup> May, 2016

*Vice-Chairperson Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting of the Parish Council with four Councillors and two members of the Public in attendance.* 

- 1. AGM As this was the Annual General Meeting the meeting began with the election of Officers. The Chairman, Cllr. Norman Osborne, The Vice-Chairperson Cllr. Charmaine Smith and Responsible Financial Officer, Mrs D Turner were all re-elected.
- 2. Community Benefit Fund Councillors approved the policy and claim form to be sent to organisations wishing to claim from the fund.
- 3. Annual Audit The audit forms were completed on behalf of the Councillors and signed as necessary by the Vice-Chairperson and RFO. The accounts had been checked by the Internal Auditor and will now be sent to the External Auditor.
- 4. Insurance Premium It was agreed to pay the insurance premium, due on the 1<sup>st</sup> June, 2016 amounting to £225.73. This was proposed by Cllr.R Reason and Seconded by Cllr I Franklyn.
- 5. Planning N Watson, Trelinney, Broad Langdon, Jacobstow. Cornwall Council had approved this application.
- 6. Big Field Wind Farm Cllr. P Chapman agreed to speak at the Big Field Wind Farm Appeal on behalf of the Parish Council on the 9<sup>th</sup> May, 2016.
- 7. Defibrillator It was noted that a demonstration on the defibrillator will take place in the Parish Hall on Thursday 16<sup>th</sup> June, 2016. at 2.00pm

Your MP Scott Mann - - For full version of this letter follow the link on www.jacobstowvillage.co.uk I visited many schools in North Cornwall and have seen how well they work under different systems, from Local Authority to Academy Trusts; I could not vote for a policy which forces schools to change their status. I have voted for an ammendment to ensure greater



protection of high value council houses. There are many of these in areas like Padstow, Boscastle and Port Isaac which through no fault of their own have increased in value. We need to make sure that local people can stay in their communities.



#### JACOBSTOW SCHOOL BLUE BASE GARDEN

In the Autumn Term of 2015, Blue Base - years 3 and 4 continued the work they had started prior to the summer holidays in their garden. Work started with preparing the ground, digging through manure to enrich the poor soil and pulling up weeds. Each week a group of children would help with the tasks which also involved learning about types of plants, taking cuttings from plants already in the school grounds, transferring self-set saplings and planting



June and July is the important time to concentrate on giving

your plants a good supply of water. So, water well and mulch your borders, probably chipped bark is the best material because it slowly rots down and stops light getting to the weeds. Do not forget to mulch your pots too, you can get various coloured gravel and glass pebbles to make it look decorative. Any gaps in your borders can now be filled with pot grown plants.

Prune any mature shrubs that have flowered, cutting about a third of the oldest thick stems low down so they grow new shoots to flower next year, but remember to feed and mulch them.

You can plant out runner beans and tomatoes now the threat of frost has gone and continue sowing your salad crops. July is the time to sow your spring cabbage for next year. Stop your tomatoes and runner beans when they reach to top of their supports and remember to keep pinching the side shoots from the leaf axils of the tomatoes. Cut off the old leaves from any strawberry plants that have fruited, but do not cut off the main growth bud in the centre. Rake up the used straw from around the plants and put it in the compost bin. Also this is the time of year to just sit and enjoy all your hard work in the garden with a nice glass of something cold!

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#### Birds of Broadlands Farm

The Marlbrook Herd was established in 1955 at Forest Row, Sussex by Andrew and Jonathan's late father.

Some of the lines in the present herd can be traced back to Reading sales in the 1950s.

In 1966 the family decided to move to Winnacott Farm in North Petherwin for more acres and better grass. They planned to move the herd down by train originally but unfortunately Dr Beeching axed the railway so the herd came down by road.

In the mid-1980s Father died and Andrew ran the dairy with help of his mother and Linda. Then in the mid 1990s Jonathan and his family

returned to Cornwall and bought Treforda Farm which was run as joint enterprise with the dairy at North Petherwin.

Then the opportunity to acquire the tenancy at Broadlands arose in 2000. This would work better with Treforda as the buildings were more suitable and reduce the distances travelled between the two holdings.



The dairy herd was walked from North Petherwin to Broadlands. A fairly smooth trip apart from little incidents like the cows exploring the ford at Canworthy Water!

After 15 years they were well settled in Broadlands. The next big event was running an Open Farm Day last June. This took a huge amount of effort but was well received by everyone who visited.

The next event? We shall have to wait and see!

#### CALOR Gas The Great Gas Battle - Sarah Smith FLO GAS

I recently received a letter from Calor Gas, my supplier, offering me a fixed price contract for either a year at 46p per litre or 2 years at 47 p. Umm, I pondered, can you change gas suppliers if you are using LPG? I googled this, was directed to a web site www.uklpg.org, and they can advise you who else supplies gas in your area.

Flo Gas was a familiar name, so I contacted them. "We can change you over to us, if you are at the end of your contract with Calor" the nice lady at Flo Gas told me. "You need to check this, if you are we can offer you a fixed year price of 32p per litre".

Bit of a jump from Calor's offer. So I rang Calor and explained the situation, they immediately offered me a match at 32p per litre and a £200 credit on my account. Well worth a phone call!

#### HELPING HEDGEHOGS

Nearly a quarter of the hedgehogs born into the world die before leaving their nest; probably a half of the rest do not survive their first hibernation. We can all assist hedgehogs that have endured these early adversities in several ways:-

1. Providing as safe an environment as possible in our gar-

dens and allotments. Whenever possible a small corner should be left as a wildlife sanctuary.

2. Accumulating materials - garden rubbish, leaves etc suitable for hedgehogs' nests (hibernacula) and supplementing their natural diet with some protein, meat based pet food or crunchy cat biscuits.

3. On the roads - Their natural defence mechanism of rolling in a ball is no protection against road traffic. Drive carefully, especially at night, and if it is safe to do so, stop and help a hedgehog across the road.

4. Pesticides in gardens are potentially dangerous to hedgehogs. Alternatives to slug pellets such as copper bands, tape or beer traps are much more friendly (although not to the slug!).

5. Make sure you turn your garden rubbish over before burning, it is safer if you make your bonfire up on the day you are going to burn it, or maybe think about investing in a incinerator.

6. Try to install a little slipway in garden ponds to help hedgehogs and other wildlife. Or maybe submerge some stones or place a small piece of chicken wire to use as a scrambling net.

Market Update



As ever the property market changed in many different ways over periods of time and its always good to know what is happening, both in terms of the local and national property market.

Locally, Bude and the surrounding areas had an extremely busy winter period, sales from October through to February being plentiful in number, with a lot of commitment both from vendor and buyer to facilitate an exchange of contracts before the end of March. A certain number of deals had to be tied up by then, due to the new stamp duty measures which were introduced by the government whereby any second home owner or Buy to Let investor has to pay an extra 3% stamp duty on their purchase as of the 1<sup>st</sup> April 2016. The local solicitors really did step up to the mark and plenty of other deals that weren't necessarily linked to the stamp duty rise were whisked along at a strong pace, creating sales that went through much more quickly and efficiently than normal. As for the last 8 weeks, since 1<sup>st</sup> April, the market has been certainly more patchy, with less commitment from vendors and buyers alike. Vendors are struggling to find suitable property, with a lack of new instructions to the market, and buyers don't seem to have the same urgency to secure properties as they did through the winter period.

#### **BIG FIELD WIND FARM APPEAL**

The Appeal has been held during May. There have been many arguments for and against. The site visits are to be held soon. We will then have to wait for the final decision from the powers that be sometime in the next six months.



Storm conditions inland were observed at Canworthy Water on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> March. Wind gusts of over 50mph were seen in a fierce line squall in the morning of the 2<sup>nd</sup> and a persistent gale blew from the north on the 9<sup>th</sup> - we lost a tall conifer here. Otherwise, March was fairly ordinary, and a total of 3.54" of rainfall was collected - this despite a 2 week completely dry period up to the 24<sup>th</sup>!

Storm "Katie" caused little effect locally on the 28<sup>th</sup> but damage generally in the rest of the country was considerable and widespread.

April was much as one would expect. The 12<sup>th</sup> should have produced thunderstorms during the early afternoon but nothing was observed locally. A total of 2" of rain was collected. The last week was really quite cold, with a persistent and strong northerly polar wind which also produced light snow showers on the 26<sup>th</sup>, with heavier falls on high ground on the 27<sup>th</sup>

Neither months produced any more than a slight ground frost here, rather too unsettled and windy generally. Spring, however, was certainly quite late this year, with our house martens and swallows very sensibly delaying their summer holiday plans!

#### What a Beautiful Place to Work! By Marion McDonald

It is Sunday morning and, unlike others who may be walking dogs, going to church, having breakfast, whilst reading the papers or sleeping off last night's revels, I am on my way to Lanhydrock House, where I am a retail volunteer in the gift shop. This is my seventh year of volunteering at Lanhydrock. I originally selected Sunday as my day because my husband used to work for Home Farm Trust and was either working on a Sunday



or sleeping off working through the night before, so it suited me and it is also usually the busiest day at the estate and the most difficult day to recruit volunteers. It is quite a long drive to Lanhydrock from Wainhouse Corner - a 50 mile round trip but the National Trust pays travelling expenses and it is a pleasant cross country drive and, on a Sunday morning the roads are quite peaceful and I can listen to "Steve Wright's Sunday Love Songs" on the way there and Johnnie Walker's "Sounds of the 70s" on the way home.

As I drive through the reception gate and down to the staff car park, I always marvel



at how beautiful Lanhydrock is, nestled among the rolling hills of the estate and surrounding countryside and, at the moment, with the woods full of bluebells, the magnolia, rhododendron and camellia trees full of blossom and the tulips in flower in the formal garden, the place is ablaze with colour. I arrive at 10.30 and prepare the shop for opening at 11.00. I put the money in the tills, turn the lights on in the display cabinets, water any plants or fill up flower vases. I do any necessary dusting

and vacuuming, if it hasn't been done the night before, fill any empty spaces on the shelves, turn the music on and then open the huge ancient door with the gigantic ancient key and put out the 'Shop Open' sign.

For the rest of the day I work mostly behind the counter, taking the money but I will also show customers where to find items and make recommendations about what to buy. I do feel it is my duty to sample some of the produce, especially the locally made Kernow Chocolate, so that I can recommend flavours that people may like. There are 20 flavours in all and my favourite used to be Caramel Sea Salt but four new ones were added recently and my favourite is now Bakewell Tart!! You do need to try them.



I enjoy chatting to the customers, smiling and greeting them as they enter, to make them feel welcome. I enjoy answering their questions about the history of the house and Agar-Robartes family who used to live there. I enjoy recommending places to go, if they are on holiday and we do have regular visitors, usually local residents who just come to walk the dog or take a stroll round the gardens

and then have lunch or a cream tea. They often pop in to see if there is a sale on or any reductions, after all, everyone likes a bargain! Many of our customers are foreign, usually German. They arrive as a coach party and are often in a rush to get round the house and shop and back to the coach to go on to the next stop on their whistle stop tour. Cornwall is a popular destination for German visitors due to the success of Rosamund Pilcher's novels, which are mostly set in Cornwall and many have been made into films for German television.

I didn't study German at school and, surprisingly, many of the visitors do not speak much English but we manage to communicate and have a laugh. They have a real problem with English money and will often just open their purses and ask me to take what is needed for what they want to buy.


The staff I work with are lovely, some well established but many of them very young, seasonal employees, still studying for AS/ A levels at school or on holiday from university. They are always very polite and pleasant and I enjoy hearing about their studies and travels and other escapades – it is a perfect way to cross the generation divide.

As a volunteer I am allowed 20% off anything in a N.T. shop, restaurant or cafeteria and free entry to any N.T. property, so we do get perks other than the enjoyment of working in a beautiful, historical building, meeting new people and knowing that what you are doing is helping to care for and preserve our heritage.

The shop manager, when thanking me for my contribution, which she does every time, commented on the fact that, from her office, she had heard me laughing all day. Surely that's what life is about!

If you wish to volunteer at Lanhydrock, they do need more room guides, especially at the weekend and the retail manager needs people to sell leaflets in the entrance hall and to work in the second hand bookshop. 
#### **Financial Transparency**

We have 24 advertisers in the Journal and have recently increased our charges from £20 to £30 per year. This will bring an expected revenue of £720 per year. We also receive a much appreciated contribution from your Parish Council which has been £500 on previous years. This gives us a yearly income of £1,220 per year and our printing costs are £1096.50 per year.
