The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 1st Tuesday of every month (except for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 pm. Members of the Public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the Agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

Editor's Note The report on each month's Parish Council meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. We have omitted certain minor items for brevity but a full version of the minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall notice board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting also the Agenda and Minutes of previous meetings are on the village website www.jacobstowvillage.co.uk

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 2nd April 2024

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six councillors, the clerk and five members of the public attending.

Footpath 6 – Estimate received for repairing post etc. amounts to £100 and £80 for cutting up and moving fallen trees. It was agreed to do the work at the moment and contact the land owner in respect of the trees.

Hedgehogs – It was decided not to purchase a sign saying Hedgehogs Crossing the Road.

Cornwall Council – Planning Application PA223/09863 Broad Langdon, Jacobstow – Cornwall Council have refused this application.

Planning Application No PA24/02222 – Erection of an Agric. Building for the purpose of housing farm machinery, animal feed and beekeeping equipment Land South of Broad Langdon, Jacobstow. It was unanimously agreed to support this Application.

Floods at Wainhouse Corner – Clerk to reply to email to say the chairperson will meet the officer to show him where the flood occurs.

Councillor matters – It was reported that the postbox at Hele Barton had disappeared. Clerk to get this replaced.

Summary of Jacobstow Parish Council Meeting held on 7th May 2024

As this was the Annual General Meeting the meeting began with the election of Officers. Re-elections of Cllr. Chairman Smith as Chair-person Re-election of Cllr. Peter Chapman as Vice-Chairman Re-election of Mrs D.A. Turner as RFO

Planning Application PA23/07598 – Broadlands Farm, Jacobstow – This application had been discussed at a previous meeting. Having received notification from Cornwall Council it was discussed again with five Councillors reluctantly agreeing to support this. Application and two Councillors objecting as there are too many cows for the size of the farm.

Accounts to pay:- C.J. Lloyd - £167.44 – (Repairs to Footpath) – Zurich – £167.44 – (Annual Insurance Premium).

Planning Application No PA24/02492 – 8 South Park, Jacobstow – two storey extension and off road parking. Councillors unanimously support this Application.

Annual Audit – The meeting approved the Accounts and completed the necessary forms. These will now be sent to the Internal Auditor for signing before being sent to the External Auditor.

SCOTT MANN - Extracts from his Facebook page.

On 30th April Scott Mann posted a long article about housing in North Cornwall. The Journal suggests its readers read this online as to take extracts may not give the right balance to



what he is saying. The gist is that he is trying to bring in more legislation to make it harder to have second homes in North Cornwall due to the affordable housing problems here.

In 2023 we established the joint government and industry Farm Tenancy Forum (the Forum) improving our engagement with the sector and supporting the implementation of our government response commitments. The main Forum, comprising Defra officials and industry organisations representing tenant farmers, landlords and professional advisors meets quarterly, with sub-groups focusing on specific issues in the interim to drive rapid progress. The Forum is having a very positive impact, ensuring that we consider the unique challenges facing the sector, facilitating more collaborative relationships between landlords and tenants, and helping to shape our farming policies and schemes so that they work for tenant farmers. One year on from the publication of the government's line-by-line response to the Rock Review we have action underway to deliver 64 out of our 75 commitments.

Drugs alert. Nitazenes.

A fifth person has been arrested in relation to a medical incident in North Devon believed to be linked to substance abuse in the area. At around 5pm on Friday evening, April 26, police and partner agencies became aware of what was locally thought to be an unusual batch of heroin circulating among drug users in Westward Ho!, Bideford and Barnstaple. Emergency service partners declared a major incident due to a number people requiring medical treatment over a short period of time. This was stood down on Saturday morning, but a total of 10 people were admitted to North Devon District Hospital for treatment. Of those, one person remains in hospital on unrelated matters. A man in his 30s from Westward Ho! died as a result of taking the substance on Friday and a second man in his 40s, from South Molton, who had earlier been admitted to hospital, died late on Saturday – believed to be as a result of taking the same substance. Two men and two women were arrested on suspicion of being involved in the supply of a controlled substance on Saturday. A fifth person, a man, was arrested on the same grounds on Sunday. "Tests continue to be carried out to ascertain what the substance is, but it is suspected that it is a substance which users will find causes more serious effects than heroin which they might usually use. Health partners are continuing to work with local drug users in a bid to safeguard them as much as possible, but we would continue to urge any users to exercise extreme caution. A BBC News article on 20th March stated more than 100 deaths have now been linked to synthetic opioids called nitazenes since the summer, according to the National Crime Agency. Radio 5 Live ran a programme about how **nitazenes** are being added to heroin and cocaine.

Users have no idea they are in the drugs they are buying and the smallest amounts can be lethal.


And I'm sure that we've all sometimes been caught by surprise when opening an Amazon parcel. However, I have to say that I was really taken aback by this recent delivery.

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Charlotte Dymond - a ghostly mystery.

The ghost of Charlotte Dymond has been seen throughout the years. Charlotte is said to have been employed as a farm servant in a farm between Davidstow and Camelford, known as Penhale Farm. It was owned by a widow who lived there with her only son. There were two other servants, two young lads, Matthew Weeks and John Stevens; both were in their early twenties while Charlotte was eighteen years old.

Charlotte and Matthew Weeks formed a sweetheart relationship. Some say Charlotte's attraction to Matthew was based on the small



inheritance Matthew had received. Charlotte had another suitor by the name of Thomas Prout who was the nephew of the farm owner.

It was on a Sunday when Charlotte was last seen as she and Matthew were headed off to the Moor. Charlotte was wearing her Sunday best. When evening arrived Matthew was seen returning to the farm alone. But, days passed before concern was raised about Charlotte not returning from the Sunday outing. When Matthew was questioned about his attire being muddy and torn he denied being at the Moor but offered an explanation for Charlotte's disappearance. He indicated that Charlotte had taken a job in Blisland.

Further investigation by those at the Farm proved this new job story to be untrue. Eventually, a search party was formed to search for Charlotte. The



search ended up with the discovery of Charlotte's body being found on the Alan riverbanks. The gruesome finding showed that her throat had been cut deeply from ear to ear. Matthew Weeks was apprehended and found guilty of the crime although he declared his innocence. Consequently, Weeks was hung, but rumours soon surfaced. Some say Charlotte committed suicide due to being pregnant and could not live with the shame. Such was the tragedy of Charlotte that a monument was erected to preserve her memory and many today believe that Charlotte's ghost makes her presence known to this very day.

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


Jacobstow Book Club



MORE MARVELLOUS MAIL BOXES.









March is really early spring down west, although it started with a cold day along with wintery showers and only 4°C during the day here in the valley. Matters didn't stay cold for long, though, with 13-15°C mid-month and by the 18th there were a few very mild days with 16.5 on the 18th, 17.2 on the following day and 16°C on the 20th.

Not really noted for being a wet month, there were more rainy days than one would expect, however and by the 28th I had collected 5,58" here at Canworthy Water. The 27th was an odd day, with colder air intrusion aloft giving rain, wet snow and hail in a heavy shower in the afternoon and thunder was heard although nothing that local. Milder surface air from the south into the 29th along with the colder mid-level conditions persisting gave a thunderstorm off Hartland Point around midday. Further showers were observed the following day, and another thunderstorm was noted on the 30th to the southwest along a marked squall line late evening.

A total of 5.84" of rain was collected for the month, against my 10 year average of 4.18".

April did more or less what is expected of it this spring, nothing too dramatic, the 8th saw gusty winds and showers during the late afternoon with the SSE wind peaking at 39 knots around 1830 and again at 2100 with a notable wind shear to the northwest. Similar conditions existed to the 13th, which was quite mild at 17C.

There was little of note that can be said for the rest of the month for the surface weather. Of note though, was that increasing solar activity gave a faint Aurora visible here on the 16th around midnight. This was to set the scene for a number of Auroral sitings later in April, although it was rather too cloudy for any further observations here.

A total of 4.28" of rain was collected for the month, against my 10 year average of 2.12". Ground conditions were noted as being more soft by now than one would expect for early spring, with matters certainly becoming a problem that hadn't really recovered from a very wet February.

He had learned to crochet to pass the time during long-haul flights for work and decided to try other crafts, including sewing, making bags and other useful items. At the end of his "gap year", he became a postman in Bude, continuing to sew in his spare time, making his own cycling gear and shirts. Encouraged by his wife and colleagues, he applied for the Great British Sewing Bee, passing the selection process to become one of the 12 participants.

The series was filmed in Leeds over 8 weeks and the competitors were sworn to secrecy throughout and until the series aired on TV the following Spring. Despite his relative inexperience, Tony completed all 30 of his garments within the tight timescales and became one of the 3 finalists. In Children's Week, he won "Garment of the week," (the white dress in the photo; the evening dress was his made-to-measure piece for the Final.) He remains an avid sewer, keen to recycle fabrics and use

zero waste patterns. Since the series, Tony has exhibited his garments at the Castle in Bude, been invited to judge at a Sewing Festival, is an Ambassador for Brother Sewing Machines and designs shirt patterns for the Emporia range.

The wet April we had made it impossible to do much outside leaving lawns growing long so "No Mow May" was a bit optimistic! Hopefully we can all leave a few wild areas now that we've tidied up the grass again. June is a busy month

for sowing seeds and planting out and generally nurturing everything, watering when it's dry and protecting plants and shrubs from heavy rain and wind

Naturally weeds and pests are appearing and need to be kept under control to allow your plants to thrive. Bolting can be a problem and is caused by changes in temperature when plants rush into their flowering stage and set seed before producing much leafy growth (fennel, chicory

and Chinese greens) so June is a good time to sow. For spinach and lettuce the cause is hot dry conditions, so sow in moist soil in partially shaded sites. Some varieties are bolt resistant and succession planting ensures a harvest before the crop has a chance to flower.

July is the beginning of harvesting the fruits and vegetables of your labour. It is also time to plant out winter crops such as brassicas,

sprouts, purple sprouting broccoli, kale and cauliflowers. To make full use of the vegetable plot, continue to plant fast-maturing crops in the gaps left from harvesting or fill with winter vegetables being planted out. If you have more produce than you can use, freezing is a good solution. For tomatoes and courgettes try making courgette ratatouille or a mixed

vegetable soup to freeze.

There is always lots to do in the garden, whether you're growing flowers and shrubs or fruits and veggies. Especially in the summer months, remember to enjoy your garden, have a seat and admire the results of your hard work.

Top Tip - When harvesting herbs, thyme, marjoram, sage and rosemary are more flavoursome if picked in the heat of the day, whereas those with softer leaves - mint, basil, parsley and coriander are best picked in the morning.



Eventually Jim and Em Cory took on the lease and then bought the premises. At that time the Inn included a farm and buildings.


