#### Jacobstow Neighbourhood Watch

Just a short article this month to reiterate some basic ways to keep your home safe and secure.

Always close and lock external windows and doors, get into the habit of checking these last thing at night before you go to bed. Don't leave keys near a door where they can be reached from outside. Even if you are out, pretend you are in, leave lights on and use timers to switch on lights and radios if you are going away.

Never leave ladders lying around and make sure you have good quality fencing and gates. Hedges in the front garden should be no higher than 1 meter, to avoid giving screen to hide behind.

If you are going away, don't advertise it on social media, check your settings and make sure you are happy who you are sharing your information with.

I was delighted with the progress made when I visited Parliament this week on the handling of the fishing community after the attacks led by French vessels in relation to scallops in the Channel. Our fishermen should be able to go about their working lives without risk to their safety. I pressed the matter with Fisheries Minister George Eustice MP, who urged me to write to two MEPs currently sitting on the European Parliament to ensure our fishermen are well protected in the future and the issue is raised on a much wider scale.

I was saddened to hear of recent developments in Delabole and the issues they have faced in regards to school transport. The route has no pavements, regularly floods and children are expected to cross at a point where the speed limit changes from 30mph to the national speed limit. The council have rejected the second bid to have the road inspected. I have personally walked the route which is highly dangerous for an adult let alone a child. The road has very poor phone signal as well, so should an accident occur these children would be unable to contact help. The council needs to take this into consideration and understand that lives are at serious risk.

#### It may be functioning but it's definitely not working!



After Nicky Chopak successfully had the long defunct flashing 40mph sign at the north of our hamlet reinstated I was looking forward to being able to exit my drive (at The Old Police House) with a confident degree of safety. Alas this is not the case. I look to my right, and, if there are no vehicles visible at the brow of the rise, I assume it is safe to pull out onto the road. Only too often I'm greeted by a speeding driver sounding their horn, flashing their lights and attempting to overtake me illegally, at speed, because they are obviously ignoring the 40mph limit. This has to stop. Wainhouse Corner has in the past witnessed many very ugly incidents that are the result of dangerous drivers choosing to blatantly ignore the legal speed limit.

I have observed that at least 50% of drivers who are "flashed" by the sign don't even apply their brakes. In the late and early hours, when driving is at its most hazardous, that rises to 90+%. If the sign is flashing and they do slow down they have already committed an offence.

In the past we had police officers and local volunteers warning drivers and using radar devices to record speeding offenders, with the aim of prosecuting them. Why has this stopped? Obviously, there is a reduction in police services available but there hasn't been a reduction in policing charges in our council tax. What we need is value for money for what we are charged for policing, and at least some visible evidence of our roads being policed.





#### **Bob's Gardening Spot**

If you bag up your fallen leaves and leave them for a year you will have very good leaf mould for your potting mixture. Now is the ideal time to plant bare rooted tress and pot grown shrubs, but give them plenty of organic matter around the roots to give them a good start.

Prune climbing roses now and tie them into supports. In November you should check your tree ties and stakes, making sure they are sturdy enough to stand winter winds, but also not too tight to restrict growth. Bare rooted trees are cheaper now so sort out what you want and place your order. Inspect the root in the pot to make sure they have not been allowed to dry out and always plant at the depth they where grown. Happy Gardening Bob

#### The Harp in the South by Ruth Park

Some facts for the summer this year. So far 24.44" of rain have been collected at the station here at Canworthy Water. Bearing in mind that March was really quite wet with 6-81" then the conditions have certainly been drier than many summers previously.

Of note, were the lack of thunderstorms, active days observed being 26/5, 1/7, and 28/7. There were a number of days when all the signs were in place but nothing developed. A lot of this was due to the high pressure which has certainly been dominating our weather keeping a lid on matters and generally inhibiting convection from getting going. This was not the case in Southern England, where the thunderstorm activity was well above average.

July rainfall saw 2.49" collected, with some areas seeing slow-moving heavy downpours, the 28th and the 29th both being very wet days: 0.5" of rain was collected in 20 minutes in a torrential downpour on the 28th.

August as usual was affected by the remnants of tropical storms, the notable one was "Debby," which moved through the area on the 12th giving 0.73" of rain by the end of the day. Conditions in August were notably very overcast with only a couple of days locally giving long sunny periods. Total rainfall collected was 3.16" which has been typical for this generally unreliable month.

As I write, (11/9) there are three significant hurricanes in the Tropical Atlantic, of which " Florence" has the potential to cause serious damage to the Eastern Seaboard of the United States. Usually we will see some impact from the dregs of these during September.

#### The Great War 1914 - 1918



They shall not grow old as we that are left grow old,

Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn.

At the going down of the sun and in the morning We will remember them.

These words, by Laurence Binyon, were written on a cliff top not too far from here, at or near Polzeath and are as relevant today as when they were first written in Sept. 1914. The Great War (often referred to as "the war to end all wars") claimed the lives of 10 million military personnel of which nearly 1 million were from Great Britain and the British Empire. They came from all walks of life and from every corner of the British Isles. Jacobstow is just one of many small Parishes in Cornwall but even here the outbreak of war could not be ignored. The Roll of Honour in the Church of St James, Jacobstow, gives a list of 32 local people who served and of these 5 were killed in action, 2 died from injuries sustained and 25 survived.

#### LOUIS EMILE de St PAER

Killed in action at the age of 61 he was born in Jersey, Channel Islands, and served as a Major in B Battery, Royal Field Artillery. He was mentioned in Sir John French's despatch of 1/1/16 for "meritous service in the field" and was awarded the Military Cross later that month. He also received the 1914-1915 Star, British War Medal WW1 and Victory Medal WW1. He died of wounds on 8 May 1918 leaving a widow and one son and was the eldest son of Mr L E de St Paer, headmaster of Jacobstow School.

Major de St Paer had joined the Royal Field Artillery (Territorials) some years before war broke out and went to the Front with the Bradford Battery of the West Riding Field Artillery. In consequence of an injury to his knee, caused by falling from his horse which was shot from under him at Vimy, he was invalided home for some time, but in February 1918 returned to the Front in France and was killed fighting with his Battery. Previous to the war Major de St Paer had been appointed Chief Clerk to the University of Leeds.

His two brothers (who were born in Lezant) also served in WW1 but survived. Arthur de St Paer served with the West Yorkshire Regiment and Basile de St Paer served with the 24<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Fusiliers.



#### JOSEPH HENRY PAYNTER

Killed in action at the age of 28, he was born in Jacobstow in 1889 and served as a Private in the 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Devonshire Regiment. His service with this regiment took him to France and then to Flanders where he died on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1917. He was awarded the British War Medal WW1 and the Victory Medal WW1. His remains are interred at the Honourable Artillery Company Cemetry.

#### JOHN WALLACE PARSONS

Killed in action on 4<sup>th</sup> September 1916 at the age of 24. Records show that he was born in Jacobstow (or Bude) in 1892 but his family emigrated to Canada and his nationality is then given as Canadian. He obviously did not forget his country of birth and enlisted at Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, Canada to help defend his mother country. He served as a Private with the 16<sup>th</sup> Battalion Canadian Infantry (Manitoba Regiment). It is regrettable, but almost inevitable, that information is more readily available on members of the Armed Forces who were killed in action than those who served but survived to return to their families. The Jacobstow Roll of Honour records the names of two soldiers who served but died of their wounds after being returned to the UK or died shortly after the war.





#### ALFRED G. HOOPER

Born in 1891 and served as a Private with the 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Royal Berkshire Regiment. Injured during the war, he was repatriated to the UK but died of his wounds in Tidworth Hospital, Salisbury, on 7<sup>th</sup> July 1916 at the age of 25. His parents lived at Titchen, Jacobstow, and he is interred in the family grave at Jacobstow United Methodist Chapelyard (Eden Chapel).

#### HAMPTON JOHN DYMOND

Born in 1888 and served as a Private with the 1<sup>st</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Wiltshire Regiment. He was awarded the British War Medal WW1 and the Victory Medal WW1 and died after the war ended on 29<sup>th</sup> May 1919 at the age of 31. His remains are interred at the Ismaila War Memorial Cemetery in Egypt. Records show that his parents lived at Canworthy Water and he and his wife lived at Rosecare, St.Gennys.

The Roll of Honour has a crest in each corner, presumably relating to the branch of the Armed Forces in which the men from Jacobstow served. The crests are for Duke of Cornwall Light Infantry, Royal Artillery, Royal Navy and Royal Air Force. The fourth crest is of particular interest as the RAF wasn't formed until 1<sup>st</sup> April 1918, just a few months before the war ended which means that one of the survivors would have been among the first to join this fledgling service. Regrettably the recorded information on those who served and returned is very limited and consequently it has not been possible to identify who this was.

So many killed and injured from so many nations. Would these sacrifices still have been made if they knew that another devastating conflict would erupt 21 years later in 1939?

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Another busy summer for the WI! In July we took part in the "Val Walks Tall" walk to raise funds for Val Bugden-Causey's campaign to raise money for research into Malignant Melanoma which has been featured on BBC's Spotlight programme.

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#### A View of Jacobstow's Footpaths by Caroline V Pallett.



Last year I undertook a study of Jacobstow's footpaths and compiled a survey recommending various improvements, most of which had to do with better signage. I was apportioned this task by the intrepid Mary Carter, a custodian of the walkways. who describes them as the 'arteries' of the landscape. I set off with no real predetermined view of what I would find. What struck me initially was how spectacular the landscape is from the highest points of the parish. What struck me soon after was that stout footwear is definitely required, a good pair of wellies being my weapon of choice...yes, that's right, even in the middle of summer! There are 13 public footpaths in the parish of Jacobstow, along with a couple of permissive paths, though no bridleways. Some of these footpaths extend into other parishes and some can be treated as circular walks when combined with roadways and the aforementioned permissive paths.

Many of England's public footpaths started life as simple trails over the countryside, naturally evolving as people

made their way to church, market, the next village or to the village school. Over the years these paths became rights of way, though their use has waxed and waned with the advent of mechanised transport and the differing reasons why pedestrians now use them...and so it is with the footpaths in our parish. However, it is important that these rights of way are kept open, for these reasons (amongst others): The connection between man and nature. It is so important that in our busy lives we keep in touch with the natural world. This has an obvious positive impact on on our physical, emotional, mental and even spiritual health. It is so easy for some of us to get used to seeing our world from the inside of our cars on tarmac roads and not really ever getting lost in a landscape that descends into ancient woodlands and over chattering streams.

The connection between the past and the present: Jacobstow's footpaths have many historical points of interest. These include a cobbled pathway made with stones from Millook beach, which has a historical link with the persecution of so-called 'witches' in the centuries leading up to the Victorian era. There is also a Holy Well near one of the footpaths, a spiritual place where the walker can sit for a while and soak up the atmosphere. One of the permissive paths is the James Way, which goes from the lane near Jacobstow Church to Blagdon, which makes up part of the Saints Way. This is an old historic sunken lane with a marvellously simple granite bridge at one end.

Seeing our parish in a different way: It astounded me as I traversed hill and valley, how the different farms and hamlets connect up and how some are right near others, when from the road, you imagine them to be miles apart. I thoroughly enjoyed finding all this out, as previously I had observed the land only by bicycle or car. So my advice is this: rain or shine, get out into nature, breathe the air and see our parish from a different perspective. Page 27

but you will also discover a colourful little Gift and Stationery shop all bundled up with a historical theme.

On the Costume side of things we are now firming up into fully-fledged research company, specialising in 18<sup>th</sup> C costume and working on projects alongside museums and conservation organisations such as The National Trust. In the shop, we have been filling up our shelves with crazy gift ideas, fun stationery, a love for history and literature, and an ever-growing selection of sewing and craft books.

It was a few years ago when we first looked into the idea of opening this themed Gift and Stationery shop, playing around with the business

## Beep Beep...Friday bus service


We now have a Bus service to Bude on Fridays, please see the timetable on the back page for details. It does take the scenic route, so why not hop on board
