Have you heard of "what3words"? It could help the emergency services to find your location more quickly. Even if your emergency is away from home, your exact location can be determined by the what3words mobile phone App.

What3words is a global address system that divides the world into 57 trillion nine-square-metre (97-sq-ft) areas, and gives each 3mx3m location in the world a unique three word address.

Emergency services across the UK including Cornwall Fire and Rescue Service and the South Western Ambulance Service NHS Foundation Trust (SWASFT) are now using the 3 word system to easily find and share locations in an emergency.




These were the two books the Book Club read this month:

Repair Café Bude – an update



Back from its August break, Repair Café Bude is open for repairs from the last Saturday in September. Since it's launch in February, the Repair Café organisers have

been overwhelmed with support from the local community with over 25 volunteer repairers and helpers giving approx 300 volunteer hours so far, giving their time to make repairs free of charge. Six months on and over 103 items have been repaired saving them from going into landfill; the items range from: Table lamps, fairy lights, a smoothie maker, CD player, clocks, mobile phones, laptops, jet washers, a toy lamb – leg falling off, bracelets, bikes and lots of zips.

Central to the idea of the repair café is skill sharing and many of the repairers and those who have brought items to be repaired are keen to share their knowledge and to learn new skills. Lots of advice is also given and repairers are often able to recommend local business for bigger jobs or those that require specialist knowledge, skills or a greater length of time. Sadly, some items are unrepairable, mostly due to the way they have been designed or manufactured.

Bob's Gardening Spot


Now is the time to build a bin to collect the leaves that are falling in gay abandon, or sweep them up and put them into black bags with holes poked in the bottom. Lift the blades on the mower to leave the grass longer. This month is the ideal time to plant any shrubs or climbers as they will settle in before it gets too cold. You should prune tall plants to about half the height to prevent wind rock in winter, especially in this part of the world! Plant up your garlic because they need a period of cold. If the ground is too wet then plant them into small pots with the top just above the compost. Leave the pots outside under a small cover to avoid the worst of the rain. Onion sets can be planted up the same.





WEATHERWISE by Monitor

The total rainfall for July was 1.64.' Fairly typical for the month locally. As a rule, the amounts for the main summer month are normally



very variable due to thunderstorms but no local activity at all here at Canworthy water. An extensive thunderstorm was observed to the East of the region on the 23rd, this was also the warmest day peaking at 29.3°C which was still around 26°C in the evening with the storm observed late PM.

The 19th saw a really wet period with 0.73" collected by the end of the day, this was the result of some tropical air finding its way up in the previous 24 hours.

Of note this summer was the lack of really hot air drawn up from Southern Europe persisting for any length of time locally. Most of the activity was concentrated in the east of the country which was a function of continental heating (extension of dry, hot air from the Sahara) which resulted in a few exceptionally hot days generally in the east of he UK.

August was cold and wet! The total rainfall collected was 4.13" which is becoming rather tedious.....we seem to have got stuck with this month being unreliable of late - it wasn't much better last year if you remember.

Far away in the Tropical Atlantic, after a quiet start several tropical depressions developed, with Dorian becoming a major hurricane. Expect the remnants of future systems to affect our area in the coming Autumn.


I got married in 2010 and invited the whole of the school to the church to celebrate with me and my husband. We honeymooned in Rome and Sorrentto and I am

We then added to our little crew in 2017 with a little baby boy called Ethan, who was so eager to arrive in the world that he was born at home and delivered by his nanny. One of the funniest things I remember about teaching was when we accidentally led a field trip through the set of the BBC drama, Casualty, and they asked us if we wanted to take part, so ended up being extras and having to tell the children "Don't look at the cameras"

New Footbridge at Tintagel Castle By Sarah Smith



We discussed at an editorial meeting that maybe one of us should do an article about the new bridge opening at Tintagel. "I'll do it," I volunteered, thinking how difficult can that be; have a look at the English Heritage site and jumble something together (no reflection on the other Journal reporters, it's just how I roll!).

Then the curse of the summer happened and we had family come to stay. I bit the bullet and went online to see what the situation was with going across the bridge, bearing in mind I'm not that good with heights.

You have to book a slot to cross the bridge online and pay £13.00 per person to visit the island and use the bridge. I booked it for the Sunday over the Bank Holiday weekend (I KNOW!). I just assumed that by the booking system they where restricting the amount of people using the bridge at any

one time; how wrong can you be. The cynic in me would say that the pre booking is a bit of a marketing ploy as when we arrived everyone was just paying there and then to go across the bridge and visit the castle.

What I did not realise is that the bridge is sectional, and as you walk across there are gaps where you can see the sea underneath you, churning away. Also, as you approach the middle of the bridge you start to notice a definite bounce to your stride and by the time you are dead middle, there is a fair bit of movement, especially if a large child is boinging up and down next to you.

The bridge connects the island with the headland where the steps start down and round to the castle, steps to the right, bridge to the left. English Heritage are now saying that Tintagel has limited access to



wheelchair users. I would dispute this, you can only go onto the island as far as the Island Courtyard, which is the first bit of land you reach and also, a manual wheelchair operator



would really struggle to get up and down the path way from the main road; it's really steep. The views from the bridge are amazing, you can see out to sea and right down along the coastline. I would say just let the novelty wear off and pick a quiet day, unless you like to bounce along!


Now moving forward, I am leading a trip to the European Jamboree, in Poland next year, with 18 girls from the Region and another Cornish Leader.


