The Parish Council meets in the Parish Hall on the 1st Tuesday of every month (except for August). Meetings commence at 7.30 pm. Members of the public are welcome to attend but any items for inclusion on the agenda should be submitted to the Parish Clerk at least 10 days before the meeting. There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the minutes.

<u>Editor's Note</u> The report on each month's Parish Council meeting is a summary prepared by the Parish Clerk. <u>We have omitted certain minor items for brevity</u> but a full version of the minutes is displayed on the Parish Hall notice board (after formal approval) at the following month's Parish Council meeting also the Agenda and Minutes of previous meetings are on the village website www.jacobstowvillage.co.uk

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 1st August, 2023

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak, the Clerk and five members of the public attending.

Declarations – Cllrs. C Smith and N Osborne declared an interest in Item 14 on the Agenda and left the room at the appropriate time. Planning Application No PA23/03746 – Detached lifetime home – land adjacent to Water Vale, Canworthy Water. Reply to Cornwall Council saying Councillors object to this Application as it is not infill and its likely to flood, it being on a flood plain.

Planning Application No PA23/05413 – Outline planning permission with some matters reserved for an Agricultural Workers dwelling – Land South of Tobarn, Jacobstow. Councillors support this Application.

Planning Application No PA23/04306 – Development comprising the delivery of a ground mounted solar farm alongside assoc.

infrastructure including distribution substation upgrades with capacity to deliver approx. 42MW of renewable energy. Land North of Canworthy House, Canworthy Water. It had been agreed with the four Parishes to ask the Applicant to hold a formal meeting to explain their proposals.

Speed limit 20mph – A local resident has asked if the speed limit can be reduced to 20mph through the village. Clerk to enquire from Oliver Jones if this would be possible.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting Held on 5th September.

Cllr Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with four Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak, The Clerk and four members of the public attending.

Wainhouse Corner Junction - Letter received from a St Gennys Councillor saying a roundabout is needed at the Wainhouse Corner Junction. Whilst we agree, we have tried so many times to get this done but nothing seems possible. The white lines should be done there this week.

The Wyldes – Email received from The Wyldes saying they have no intention of getting any bigger.

Health & Safety concerns – Regarding the broken kerbstones outside the properties at Lower Kents someone from Cornwall Council has visited and these will be replaced.

Road Closure - It was reported that Edgar Road will be closed from 13th November, 2023 to 26th January, 2024 (24hrs)

KMD Development, Edgar Road – The children at Jacobstow School held a competition to choose a name for the new Development at Edgar Road. The name Goldfinch Close was chosen. Councillors unanimously agreed that this was a good name.

Cory Close – A resident from Cory Close complained about the noise from one of the workshops adjoining her property. Very noisy work on car repairs outside the workshop, at all hours. Cllr. Chopak to look into this.

Your MP Scott Mann - - This information is obtained from Scott's Facebook page

Dentistry continues to be a key priority for me so I'm very pleased that planning permission has been given for a new NHS dental facility in North Cornwall. The new practice will be built just outside of Launceston in Sheers Barton and has my full support. Although it's very early on in the process I will keep you updated as we progress.



As many of you will know, the lack of available dentistry has been a historical issue for the whole of Cornwall and something which is a challenge to solve. In my experience, the NHS Dental contract brought in under the previous government has been the main issue brought to my attention by North Cornwall's dentists, who struggled to deliver care for NHS patients due to its terms. Along with my Cornish MP colleagues, I have taken this up with the Secretary of State and senior advisors in the Department for Health and Social Care, and I am pleased that the contract has now been amended. This is a welcome initial step, but we need to go further to ensure that dentists who deliver NHS care have the best possible terms, whilst ensuring the Cornish taxpayer gets value for money.

Dog-related laws every owner should know

Since The Control of Dogs Order 1992 - Legally, all dogs must wear a collar and ID tag when out in public, Since 2016, it is also a legal requirement across the UK to have your dog microchipped by the time they are eight weeks old and to keep your contact details up to date on one of the government standard registers. The police enforce microchip legislation; if your dog was to be picked up as a stray or scanned by the dog warden for another reason, you have 21 days to get them chipped to avoid a fine.

It's important to check your dog is microchipped when you bring them home and that you keep the details on their microchip up to date throughout their lives. If you're not sure if your dog is microchipped, your vets should be able to check their chip and provide help and advice..

It is illegal to allow your dog to foul on public land without cleaning it up Please note that this list is not exhaustive and there may be other laws that apply depending on your location and circumstances. If you have any further questions or concerns, I recommend consulting with a legal professional.

The importance of Flying Insects

Have you noticed there are less insects around? A recent survey showed that the UK's flying insect population has declined by as much as 60% in the last 20 years. Insects are important to humans and the ecosystem for many reasons including:



Pollinating crops, including many fruits, vegetables and nuts As a food source for birds and small mammals Cleaning the environment - Insects and their larvae consume large quantities of decaying debris

Causes of the decline are believed to be related to the use of pesticides and fertilisers, loss of habitat such as meadows, woodland and hedgerows, air pollution and climate change.



Being less tidy in our gardens and leaving some areas where fallen leaves, branches and natural debris are left undisturbed helps insects to survive and thrive, as can creating a Bug Hotel.





Autumn Gardening

Gardening is a continuous learning curve especially when the weather is unpredictable! October is a time for harvesting tomatoes, runner beans, pumpkins and squashes. Keep checking plants for signs of blight and stress and collect your produce before they are affected. Green tomatoes may ripen indoors but if not, they can be useful additions to sauces and chutneys. If possible, after harvesting, leave pumpkins in a warm, dry place (greenhouse or conservatory) for 10 days for the skins to



firm up before storing them. Once crops have been collected, greenhouses benefit from a good clean to prevent pests and diseases from overwintering in them and they can then be used for tender plants, cuttings etc. Lining the sides with bubble wrap for insulation is worthwhile.

Parsnips can remain in the ground until late autumn and are said to have a sweeter taste if subjected to the frost. Draw soil around the swollen stems of celariac to keep them white, then harvest in late autumn. They will store well if the leafy tops are removed and they are kept cool. Whilst not to everyone's taste as a vegetable, celariac makes a delicious soup when combined with other vegetables or apples.

Winter brassicas may need protecting from birds as the weather cools. Garlic can be planted in October and likes a sunny site with free-draining soil. If you like to start some broad beans in the autumn, it is useful to place cloches over the sowing area beforehand to warm the soil and keep off any heavy rain.

The autumn months are ideal for digging over empty areas of the garden and adding compost and manure which will be broken down by winter frosts. When clearing debris, add any green material to the compost heap unless it is diseased. Mulch around rhubarb and shrubs to feed and protect them from colder weather. It is also a good time to prepare the garden for winter and to check on the condition of paths, fences, shrubs and hedging. Support plants that might be affected by the wind.

New and lifted bulbs can be planted through the autumn for a colourful Spring display, either in pots or in the ground. Add grit to improve drainage especially just below the bulbs when planting to prevent rotting.

July, which truly is a high summer month was a washout this year. Persistent polar low pressure systems with west to northwesterly winds gave cool and often wet conditions for most of the month. Only three days were completely dry, and there were a number of days when rainfall was notable. Of particular note was the 4th, when heavy rain starting early gave 1.32" collected here at Canworthy, then mid-morning showers and further rain periods continued into early evening. A total of 1.98" had been collected by the end of the day. A couple of thunderstorms were observed off the north coast on the 9th with one of these inland in North Devon during the afternoon. The 10th saw another wet day with rain onset early afternoon to evening, the 14th and 17th gave further moderate accumulations with even more on the 22nd.

It managed to dry up a little towards the end of the month but no days were without some light rain or drizzle of sorts, and the total collected for the month was 7.66", 194.6mm. My 10 year average is about 3".

A very cool month, the only day with anything like summer temperatures was on the 7th at 23°C.

August was typical of late. A brief thunderstorm was observed off Falmouth on the 1st, the 2nd gave a wet day with 0.93" collected. The first named storm by Met Eireann "Antoni" gave gusty northwest winds to 37 knots during the period on the 5th, but didn't really affect us much locally. Little in the way of rain was observed through to the 13th, when a thunderstorm off Penzance was noted tracking northwards in the evening. Generally a weak affair, another one was observed seaward of Bude by late evening. Further thundery outbreaks were observed on the 25th to the east of the Duchy; they were confined to high ground and were weak and short-lived. It's been a fairly quiet year for storms so far, with just 10 recorded within sensor range here.

Temperatures were average, the odd warm day but nothing exceptional, 23°C being generally the maximums.

A total of 3.76" was collected here, which was exactly my 10 year average.

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GREEN TOMATO CHUTNEY RECIPE

This simple, small volume recipe for chutney is ideal for potting into small jars that will mature just in time for Christmas gifts.

1kg green tomatoes, finely chopped 500g onions, finely chopped 2 fresh green chillies, halved, de-seeded and finely chopped 500g cooking apples, peeled, cored & chopped 2 garlic cloves, crushed 1 tsp ground ginger Generous pinch of ground turmeric Generous pinch of ground cloves 50g raisins 250g soft dark brown sugar 300ml white wine vinegar



Place the tomatoes, onions, and chillies into a large pan on a low heat until they begin to soften. Add the apples, mixing well.

Add the garlic, ginger, cloves and turmeric, then stir in the raisins, sugar and vinegar.

Bring to the boil, reduce the heat, cover and simmer for $1\frac{1}{4}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours until thickened.

Transfer the chutney to warm dry jars, cover the surface with a waxed paper disc and top with an airtight, vinegar proof lid.

Label and store in a cool, dark place for at least 3 weeks to mature. Can be stored unopened for 6-12 months.

POSTAGE PRICE INCREASES

From Monday 2 October 2023, postage costs will rise although standard second-class stamps will remain at their current price of 75p.

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
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On 10th August, 30 members, past members and guests gathered for afternoon tea to celebrate the WI's 85th year in Jacobstow. The Hall was decorated with

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
HOPSCOTCH for ALL!

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

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Phantom in a Field - South Petherwin, Launceston

This is one of the best documented tales and was recorded by Reverend John Ruddle (pictured). Headmaster of the Grammar School at Launceston and Vicar of Altarnun and St. Mary's. Launceston. It was later adapted into various ghost stories under the title 'The Botathen Ghost'. In the mid-1600s, Rev. Ruddle visited a couple who told him that their young son Sam was claiming he regularly saw a ghost and was very distressed. Ruddle, agreed to speak to him. To his alarm, Sam recounted a very convincing tale: that a ghostly lady appeared daily on the field that he crossed to get to school (outside South Petherwin).



The spectre would follow him, or suddenly appear and meet him several times within the same field. Gradually, the lad had become terrified, and even tried a different route to school but the apparition still appeared to him.

Ruddle agreed to go with him into the field and recorded the following: "We went into the field, and had not gone a third part before the spectrum, in the shape of a woman, with all the circumstances he had described the day before, so far as the suddenness of its appearance and transition would permit me to discover, passed by. I was a little surprised at it, and though I had taken up a firm resolution to speak to it, I had not the power, nor durst I look back; yet I took care not to show any fear to my pupil and guide." He returned to the boy's family and took them to the field where they not only saw the ghost, but confirmed that it was Dorothy Dingley, a neighbour's girl who they had seen buried 8 years before after a suspicious death. The girl in question apparently had been in a relationship with Sam's older brother who had since disappeared in London. Convinced that the ghost was truly a disturbed spirit, Ruddle agreed to carry out an exorcism of the field and recorded a famously detailed and articulate account including the following: "Soon after five I stepped over the stile into the haunted field, and had not gone



above thirty or forty paces before the ghost appeared at the further stile. I spoke to it in some short sentences with a loud voice; whereupon it approached me, but slowly, and when I came near it moved not. I spoke again, and it answered in a voice neither audible nor very intelligible. I was not in the least terrified, and therefore persisted until it spoke again and gave me satisfaction; but the work could not be finished at this time. Whereupon the same evening, an hour after sunset, it met me again near the same place, and after a few words on each side it quietly vanished, and neither doth appear now, nor hath appeared since, nor ever will more to any

man's disturbance....These things are true and I know them to be so, with as much certainty as eyes and ears can give me."


