There is an opportunity to raise questions at the beginning and end of the Council meeting but questions (and answers) raised at these times are not recorded in the Minutes.

Summary of Minutes of Meeting held on 2nd September 2025

Cllr. Charmaine Smith chaired the monthly meeting with six Councillors, County Cllr. Nicky Chopak and the Clerk attending.

<u>Co-Opting Councillor</u> – It was agreed to Co-Opt Kym Anderton onto the Council and she was then welcomed by the Councillors.

<u>Planning Application PA23/43306</u> – Solar Farm, land north of Canworthy Water, Launceston. The Appeal was allowed. The Application for the award of costs was refused.

<u>Planning Application – PA25/05678 –</u> Application for permission in principle for the construction of between one and four dwellings (minimum 1 maximum 4) Land East of Drumeagles. Councillors object to this as there is poor access and poor visibility on this very narrow road. It is a single track road, unlit, and will be a danger to the Owner(s) of the property(s) and to passing traffic.

<u>CRCC Rural Coastal Roadshow</u> - A Community Roadshow will take place in Jacobstow Village Hall on 2nd October 2025 between 11.00am & 2.00pm. All are Welcome.

<u>Dogs on Beaches</u> - Review of Dogs on beaches agreed the same. Local beaches Crackington Haven, Crooklets & Widemouth Bay - No dogs allowed between 10.00 & 6.00pm Summerleaze dogs on lead between 10.00am & 6.00pm.

<u>Vans parked at Eden Chapel</u> – Residents complaining about Vans parked at Eden Chapel making vision very difficult. Clerk had written again to the Highways Dept.

<u>Fuel Poverty</u> - Correspondence received regarding fuel poverty from a Service that is free of charge to all residents experiencing issues with keeping warm.

Methodist Musings – Light and Dark

The nights are drawing in and it's time to snuggle up by the fire with a hot chocolate and a good book, or a cup of tea and our favourite TV "soap". For some of us it might be time to reflect on autumn nights past, perhaps as children, when we'd have Conker Conquests or play board and card games with the family. Or perhaps we're "planners" and this time of year gives us the opportunity to prepare for the forthcoming festive seasons, making "to do" and "to buy" lists so we're ahead of the game.

However we choose to spend our evenings at this time of year, there's no escaping the fact that it's getting darker and we're hurtling towards the day when we "fall back" and gain an hour's sleep as the clocks change (Sunday 26th October). Soon it will be "lights on" by 5.00pm, and we'll have more time to enjoy the night sky in this beautiful part of North Cornwall, pleasantly bereft of light pollution, and enabling us to look up at the myriad of stars and planets (cloud cover permitting!).

Of course, if we do go out for an evening walk, we now need to remember to take a torch in order to avoid the potholes and puddles we might encounter along the way which always reminds me of those words of Jesus in the New Testament Book of John when he says "I am the light of the world. 






BOOK REVIEW

'Light Over Liskeard' by Louis de Bernieres




This story is set in a future where humans have become redundant and sit glued to their screens whilst 'bots' do the work. Q, the main character is a brilliant quantum cryptographer, who advises the government on all the latest cyber attacks to threaten the country. He believes that society will soon, inevitably, collapse, so he moves out of London and buys a dilapidated farmhouse on Bodmin Moor, which he renovates and turns into a kind of fortress where he, his family, and his closest neighbours may be able to survive the final demise of civilisation. Whilst this is

a science fiction fantasy, it does seem uncomfortably close to how we may see our world evolving. It is a thoroughly good read.

'The Road Home' by Rose Tremain

Lev travels to London from his village in Eastern Europe to find work. His wife has recently died and the lumber yard, where he and most of the men in the village worked, has closed down, so he needs find a new life and to earn money to send home to his mother and daughter. At first, in a strange place, where he knows no one, he has to live on the street and make a few pounds distributing leaflets. Eventually he finds a room in a flat, shared with a depressed, drunken Irishman, a girlfriend and a job washing up, in a high-end restaurant. He gradually becomes more interested food and cooking and he dreams of returning


home to open his own restaurant but how is he going to realise that dream, when he earns so little money just washing pots? Lev is a flawed but attractive and resilient character and it is difficult not to become guite emotionally involved in his struggle to succeed.



Usually the main summer month, July was rather disappointing this year. High pressure remained to the northwest out in the Atlantic, and although extending a firm ridge across the southwest it really was in the wrong place for the hot weather one would hope for in July. Fairly settled for the first week, light rain showers were observed locally the first part of the following week before an improved high ridge pushed the winds to light and variable around southeast. This picked up the day temperatures with 25.4°C on the 9th, 26.5 on the following day then a guite hot day on the 11th at 28.7°C. This held until the weekend with 27.5°C on Sunday the 13th. Unfortunately, this didn't hold up, the high declined and drifted northwards and with the winds veering more westerly, rain showers were observed with a heavy downpour in the morning of the 14th. It then remained unsettled with further rain along with poor visibility at times in hill fog most mornings first thing. The 20th was a pretty wet affair, with 0.54" being collected by the evening. All the indications were there for thunderstorms that day but it didn't do anything locally, just heavy showers with towering cumulus noted. Matters didn't change much to the end of the month, apart from the brief hot spell it generally was a fairly cool.

A total of 1.86", 47mm of rain was collected for July, against my 10 year average of 2.98", 76mm. So although dryer than normal, July could have tried harder this year.

Augusts down west tend not to be very reliable. However, this one was an improvement than of late. The 4th was a bit wet, with southerly winds that became quite gusty during the period with 0.45" of rain in the gauge by the evening. It then settled down, with some days giving the odd light coastal drizzle intruding inland at times but not amounting to much. Not everywhere stayed dry, the 11th had thunderstorms in the southwest of the Duchy but they remained there, being mostly a function of sea breeze convergence more than anything else. Fairly warm by early afternoon at 24.5°C, it got to 26° on the12th, but cooled a little by the following day with 22-23°C typically by early afternoon. This trend held to the end of the month, some days giving rain periods but only the 28th was of note, with 0.45" collected by the evening. So although a little on the cool and humid side at times, not too bad for once.

A total of 2", 51mm was collected against my 10 year average of 3.04", 77mm.


Parking scam via Text

WEEK ST MARY BONAVENTURES W.I.

Following a talk by AI, the owner of Trigon Farm earlier this year, a group of members took up his invitation to visit and spent a beautiful evening seeing the vegetable and flower beds and hundreds of trees that had been planted since the family move to the farm in 2020. Starting from scratch, the farm was designed using permaculture principles and regenerative agricultural practices – the produce and flowers are grown chemical free with the no-dig method where the soil is left undisturbed to allow the micro-organisms, fungi and worms to do their work. In turn the whole soil structure improves over time and the aim is to create a stable, bio-diverse system.

Different species of willow are being grown for wind breaks, structures and for weaving material and there are poly-tunnels to deal with varied weather conditions, ensuring that the farm is virtually self-sufficient in vegetables and fruit, including during the winter using frozen and preserved food. In addition to the chickens and ducks, goats are now kept and pigs will soon be added. Our tour of the garden ended with a choice of traditional tea or delicious homemade mint tea and biscuits and plans are being made for a further visit to sample the food later in the year.



The farm offers various courses and workshops such as Natural skincare. They also offer sustainable flowers for any occasion, including weddings, as well as guided farm tours and Pizza evenings. According to the season, the farm also sells skincare salves, vegetable boxes, PYO flowers, posies, bouquets and wreaths.

AUTUMN GARDEN ACTIVITIES



It can be rewarding - and economical - to propagate plants to increase stocks and to share spares with other gardeners. Many garden plants are easy to increase and autumn is a good time to divide flowering perennials and grasses. Dividing helps to rejuvenate the plant as well as providing filler plants for the garden beds. If the ground is very wet, this can be delayed until spring. Dig up a clump and divide using a fork, gently easing the roots apart. Add compost to the new position, firm the soil and water in well to give them a good start. Mature rhubarb crowns can also be divided. Ensure

that each section includes one or more buds. Add compost or well rotted manure when replanting and mulch well around the crowns to protect them from frosts and to prevent rotting over the winter.

Layering is suitable for plants with flexible stems such as clematis, camellia and honeysuckle and for those than naturally run, such as strawberries. Choose a young, low stem and make a deep hollow where it reaches the soil, then peg it down and cover with a soil and compost mix. Stake the tip of the

cover with a soil and compost mix. Stake the tip of the layered stem to secure it. It may take up to a year for the plant to root and show signs of growth when it can be cut from the parent plant and planted.



Many trees and shrubs can be propagated from hardwood cuttings taken in the autumn. Dig a short trench around 20cm deep and add a mix of compost and sharp sand in the bottom. Remove a stem from your chosen plant of approx 30-40cm in length. Make a straight cut at the base below a

bud and aiming for a 25-30cm length, trim the top with a sloping cut just above a bud. Dip the base into some hormone rooting powder and insert it into the trench leaving the top third above the ground. Space the cuttings approx 10-

above the ground. Space the cuttings approx 10-15cm apart, gently refill the trench with soil and firm. Water thoroughly now and during any long, dry spells and they will be ready to plant out next autumn. Cuttings can also be brought on in potsusing a compost & sharp sand mix, insert the cuttings around the edge of the pot and place in a cold frame or unheated greenhouse.



where we could soon glimpse the sea. The beach at Millook was deserted and we enjoyed our swim; the sea temperature at this


